Team Kadena fuels joint operations training for Army, Marines

8/1/2017 — Members from the U.S. Army Aviation Battalion Japan and the 1st Battalion, 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) converged on Kadena July 31, through August 3, for a battalion collective training exercise.

The exercise tested the unit readiness to respond to planned and unplanned contingencies, and they used Kadena and 18th Logistics Readiness Squadron fuels management flight to make sure those operations could be completed.

"We come down here to do joint training with the 1st Special Forces Group because they're the only Army maneuver group in Japan that we can work with," said U.S. Army Chief Warrant Officer 3 Jimmy Kafer, a pilot for the USAABJ. "It gives us a chance to do training in a field environment, and an opportunity to do confined area landing, sling load operations, and airborne operations."

The USAABJ used UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters for the exercise due to its versatility of use. UH-60s are capable of use for cargo sling load, parachute jumps, as well as medical evacuation and VIP transport.

The 18th LRS fuels management team is the lifeline to flight operations. Without the fuel, flight operations cannot happen, and members like U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Jerald Hickmon, 18th LRS fuels distribution supervisor keep operations moving.

"We enable units to maintain flight ops through fuel support by supporting any and every aircraft that comes through, whether it's diesel or gasoline," said Hickmon. "We make sure they get the fuel, because without us they wouldn't be able to fly."

The UH-60s used by the U.S. Army are similar to HH-60's stationed at Kadena, but the obstacles of working with different units made the job a challenge for the 18th LRS Fuels team.

"One of the obstacles for fueling some of these special ops aircraft is they have the blades running," said Hickmon. "We have to have specialized, qualified people for the hot refueling, and we have to position our guys out there prior to them landing."

Last year alone, the 18th LRS Fuels team distributed over 40 million gallons of fuel during operations, at an estimated cost of \$88.8 million. The unit vehicle inventory consists of 57 vehicles, including the 40 R-11 Refuelers that are ready, on

call and prepared to service aircraft at a moment's notice.

Kafer and other members of USAABJ successfully completed their training thanks to Team Kadena's capabilities and mission readiness.

"I don't think we'd be here and be able to do what we do without your support," said Kafer. "If we didn't have that level of support, it would have been a much more difficult transition to be able to do mission support here ourselves."

Cope Angel strengthens alliances on mainland Japan

8/14/2017 - MISAWA AIR BASE, Japan — Team Misawa and Japan Air Self-Defense Force members executed exercise Cope Angel 17 side-by-side at Draughon Range and Misawa Air Base, Japan, Aug. 9, for the first time on the country's mainland.

CA17 is an annual bilateral event between the JASDF, known as the Koku-Jieitai, and U.S. Air Force in order to fortify interoperability between Team Misawa

and the Koku-Jieitai pararescuemen. This allows for the development of exceptional Koku-Jieitai and USAF unit leaders to head the world's most powerful teams in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region.

"It's really important we perform trainings like Cope Angel 17 to assess our capabilities to work with the JASDF," said Capt. Phillip McCoy, a 13th Fighter Squadron F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot. "It's very possible they could be the rescue asset for our pilots because if something were to happen and there is a life-threatening situation,

time is critical, especially with the extreme weather we can get here in Misawa."

In the past, the Koku-Jieitai Okinawa Prefecture Rescue Squadron and members from Kadena Air Base, conducted the exercise on the island of Okinawa. This year, Team Misawa worked with the Koku-Jieitai Akita Prefecture Rescue Squadron pararescuemen and their UH-60J Black Hawk to train contingencies.

"This training allows us to strengthen alliances and give CA17 a better exercise environment while enhancing our unit-to-unit coordination with Koku-Jieitai," said Master Sgt. Reid Beveridge, the 35th Operations Support Squadron superintendent and CA17 overlord.

With the exercise held on mainland Japan, it gave the APRS the opportunity to heighten their rescue procedures and overcome language barriers with U.S. personnel so they can respond to situations fluidly in the future.

"The language barrier was the biggest issue, but it will continually improve during exercises like this," said U.S. Air Force Senior Airman Dylan Gorr, a 35th Medical Support Squadron emergency medical technician. "The opportunity to execute search and rescue exercises is rare

in Misawa and it is a great opportunity to hone our skills alongside Koku-Jieitai."

The scenario started out when an F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot simulated ejection at Draughon Range. The downed pilot used his survival training, ensuring his safety and stabilizing the situation. Once the scene cleared, he initiated rescue efforts by sending coordinates and waited for a recovery team.

"The coordination was a big piece we wanted to focus on in this exercise," Beveridge said. "How we get the right people, like the military decision makers and tasking authorities, to approve the rescue before it takes off."

Beveridge added the goal of the exercise was to initiate, retrieve and transport the individual to the 35th Medical Group where they would simulate treatment.

After working with the APRS, the Koku-Jieitai pararescue team said they want to make the CA17 exercise an annual event for mainland Japan in addition to Okinawa.

"Our pilots are the tip of the spear," Beveridge said "Our whole wing exists so our pilots can take off, 'fight tonight' and defend the U.S. and its allies. Our personnel recovery mission gives them the confidence to go out there and fight even if an incident like this were to happen."

Public Health: running the trap

8/4/2017 - MISAWA AIR BASE, Japan — The 35th Fighter Wing Public Health team is charged with protecting Team Misawa from a vast array of illness and disease by minimizing health risks within the community.

"Public health's motto is 'preventing disease, premature death and disability," said Airman 1st Class Morgan Boyd, a 35th Aerospace Medicine Squadron public health technician.

One way to prevent a possible disease outbreak is by setting up New Jersey Light Trap- Co2's, in an attempt to trap mosquitos around base.

"The whole point of trapping is to catch mosquitos and see if they're carrying disease," explained Boyd. "We sort through the insects we trap and extract female mosquitos because they're the ones able to hold and transmit diseases."

The process of trapping and sorting through insects can be tedious and take days. The traps are set, the insects are caught and removed and the sorting

"If you find a mosquito or something that looks like it might be a mosquito, you can check it with a magnifying glass or microscope to see if it has a proboscis, or the straw like object they bite you with that can transmit diseases," said Boyd. "Once you identify it is a mosquito you have to look at the antenna. Males will have a bushier antenna and females will have less bushy antennae."

Once all the female mosquitos are identified, they're sent out to Detachment 3, Analytical Laboratory at Kadena Air Base, Japan, to identify whether or not they're carrying any possible diseases, such as; dengue fever, zika virus or chikungunya.

"If the tests come back with remnants of something, we work with pest management and notify base leadership of increased threat," said Tech. Sgt. Anthony Nelson, a 35th AMDS public health technician. "Then we take environmental measures to stop what's going on or control it or notifying the base populous of preventative measures to help decrease the chances of contracting the disease."

When finding locations to set the traps, public health collaborates with pest management to develop a vector surveillance plan to identify the searching areas they see the most mosquitos.

'This program is extremely vital to mitigate transmittable diseases that could be fatal to not only the base populous but our Japanese allies," Nelson said. "We also share information with them, so both our data collectively helps build a program to mitigate the threat.

The job of public health is to catch these things before they start, allowing the populous to remain worry free.

Saving life and limb is why we do this," said Nelson. "Disease surveillance safeguards people stationed here, allowing them to have a great experience without the worry of what's out there that puts their health at risk."

Responsible for everything from educating Airmen on safety procedures and food inspection to investigating hazardous materials and sanitary

standards, these professionals perform public health activities ensuring Airmen at Misawa remain healthy.

'The program is very small in visibility because it's just an everyday thing people don't think about," Nelson said. "If you go camping or are outdoorsy, sometimes you may forget about bug spray or other safety methods from time to time. That's where we like to step in and do what's within our control to ensure safety so everyone can continue to not have to worry about the small things

in life, which keep you safe."

Without the dedication of the Airmen in the public health office, prevention would fall by the wayside, and base readiness could decline.

"Public health tracks everything, so without us, there wouldn't be any means of prevention," Boyd said. "Trapping mosquitos may seem like a small thing, but this is a major way to lower the risk and prevent someone from contracting a major disease like, dengue fever, zika virus or chikungunya."

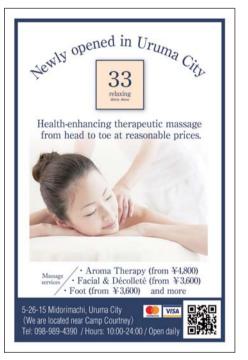

8/14/2017 — Imagine you are in a life-threatening situation. You survey

your surroundings and play out various scenarios in your mind. You have seconds to decide how to protect yourself. Do you run away or do you fight your way to safety? How you react to this situation is your intuitive "fight or flight" response. What is 'Fight or Flight'?

Your fight or flight response occurs when tough situations or stressors challenge or threaten your mind and body. Although the fight or flight response is "normal", service members and combat veterans with posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) may have an elevated fight or flight response.

Navy Lt. Cmdr. Jorielle Houston, chief of the practice based implementation network for the Deployment Health Clinical Center, said that the fight or flight response is also referred to as acute stress response.

"It is our body's reaction to determine if we need to fight, or flee," she said. "A series of neural (brain) and physiological (body) mechanisms rapidly activate the nervous system to release stress hormones (adrenaline) that helps us mobilize and avoid harm."

Depending on the situation, Houston said, our body can react in two ways: You can either confront the situation or

Impact on People with PTSD

According to Houston, a PTSD diagnosis falls under the category of trauma and stress-related disorders. People diagnosed with PTSD may:

- ·Persistently re-experience the traumatic event (nightmares, flashbacks or some other physical or emotional distress). ·Avoid trauma-related stimuli.
- ·Experience negative thoughts or feelings that begin or worsen after the trauma.
- ·Have trauma-related arousal and reactivity.

These experiences, and common low-level stressors, can cause additional

health concerns for someone with PTSD.

"When a separate stress reaction happens, people with PTSD are likely to have an increased fight or flight response," Houston said. "Research suggests that combat veterans have overactive fight or flight responses, which means higher adrenaline levels and less control of their heart rate in response to blood pressure changes."

In simpler terms, a person with PTSD in a state of chronic stress is like an engine that is idling too high for too long – after a while the engine will stop performing properly. According to Houston, potential health issues from long-term acute stress include high blood pressure, heart disease and stroke.

Family Support

Family members and loved ones provide crucial support for a service member coping with PTSD. Houston encourages families to talk openly and discuss ways they can support their service member coping with trauma.

"Learn what their triggers are," said Houston. "Learn breathing techniques; engage in physical activity; ensure they have somebody to talk to."

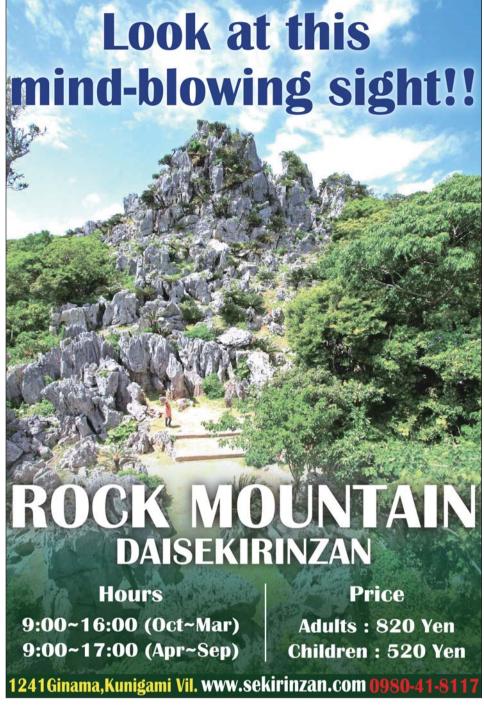

WannaCry? Not about ARAD.

8/11/2017 — WannaCry, the ransomware virus that spread earlier this year, affected hundreds of thousands of computers worldwide. As we all know, keeping safe in times of cyberattack requires speed and agility - from quickly becoming aware of the endpoints at risk to patching those vulnerabilities successfully. Recently, our Financial Management (FM) leadership at Ellsworth Air Force Base saw the speed and agility of ARAD, the Automated Remediation Asset Discovery system, first hand. In the time it usually takes to identify an attack, research and gather data, then communicate properly to those affected, countless more endpoints, networks, and in our case, Air Force financial data, can be put at risk. Thankfully, by using the new system, we were spared this impact.

On May 16, after accessing ARAD, Mr. Todd Cessna, a SAF/FM Air Force Financial Systems Office (AFFSO) System Administrator, spotted the WannaCry query specifically created to check systems for outdated software. With read-only access across the base, he executed the query and in less than 20 seconds he saw staggering results: 52 endpoints in need of attention, totaling more than 500 vulnerabilities. Within that, 34 endpoints were FMowned – that's roughly 240 vulnerabilities on our machines. Todd sprang into action, scheduling a meeting with the 28th Communications Squadron to give a short demo of ARAD, provided the query

"I'm in awe, myself, of the capabilities of ARAD," said Mr. Cessna. "It's about time the Air Force has a product that's up to speed."

Equipped with the query results, FM had insight into exactly which endpoints were most vulnerable and specifics about what needed patching within seconds rather than the weeks it would have taken to gather this same information. As we worked quickly to fix things on our end, Mr. Cessna partnered with the local server support team to install patches and update registry values. By 22 May, we mitigated vulnerabilities on 24 endpoints and since then have completed the remaining ten.

In the short six months since being declared initially operational capable (IOC), the ARAD system has made major headway in increasing cybersecurity and mission assurance for the Air Force. Thanks to the team's use of such a dynamic system, we were spared critical damage and saw just how powerful of a tool we have at our fingertips.

List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. THE SHIMA BANANA, A MEMORABLE HOLIDAY FOOD!

In subtropical Okinawa, families who grow bananas are not uncommon and bananas can often be seen in gardens while driving or walking around.

If you look closely, you will see that this 'shima banana', or island banana, is slightly different to the common banana.

It is smaller than those from the Philippines or Taiwan and is similar to the monkey banana, but its size and shape vary from the typical characteristics.

Other bananas are no competition in regards to taste.

Harvested from May to October, this banana has a springy texture and a rich, creamy sweetness with a slightly sour taste which makes it addictively delicious.



Not only is it only available in small quantities, but the shima banana is also used as an offering around Obon Festival.

It is ready to eat when the skin turns yellow and brown spots appear. Unlike ordinary bananas, it is still fresh even when the skin turns black.







Mail Address Format

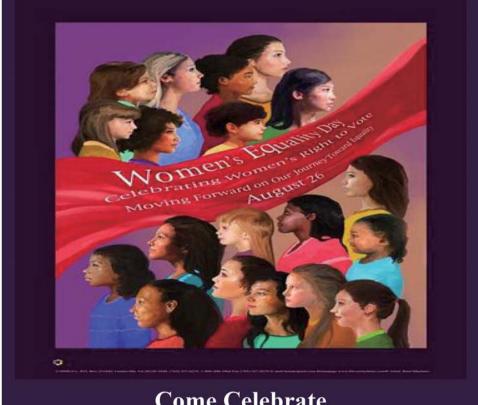

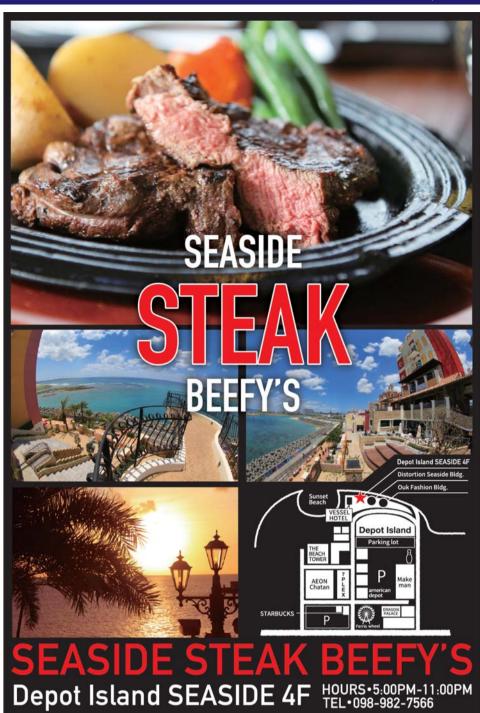
