

Maintaining refuelers: keeping jets in the air

12/21/2017 — While everyone seems to know the importance of putting aircraft in the sky, some may not understand the amount of support that goes into successful air power. The 18th Logistics Readiness Squadron Vehicle Maintenance - more specifically members of the refueling maintenance shop – know just what it takes to support the mission.

Vehicle maintenance deals with any and all government owned vehicles; from excavators and forklifts to firetrucks and security forces cars and trucks. Within that array lies the refueling trucks – a key component to getting jets off of Kadena Air Base's runway and into the air.

With many different specialties in vehicle maintenance, Staff Sgt. David Bustria, 18th LRS vehicle maintainer, has made his way to the outlying refueling maintenance shop after six and a half years in the career field.

"The more experience you get, and excel in a position ... They'll rotate you to a different place," Bustria explained. "As a 7-level we have to be well rounded."

During technical school, the career field is broken down into different specialties or vehicle types, but Airmen will only specialize in one at a time, giving them an opportunity to master one before moving on to learn about a new

In a few short months, Bustria has learned the ins and outs of maintaining and repairing refueling trucks.

Amongst the refueling vehicles Bustria works with are the R-11, R-12 and C300 - each giving him an opportunity to diagnose and fix minuscule issues such as replacing seals, changing tires, to more difficult tasks such as locating and stopping air leaks as well as troubleshooting and correcting complicated issues in the engine.

Despite being new to the world of refueling maintenance he has been able to adjust effortlessly. With nearly half the shop being made up of civilian workers, Bustria and the other vehicle maintainers rely heavily on the seasoned workers.

'The civilians are really amazing on how they do their job; some have been here for like 20 years," he explained. "What better guide or master to get the experience from than the civilians?"

Although the ultimate focus of the shop is to ensure every aircraft that comes down is able to be refueled the refueling maintenance members still see to it to help one another.

"We synergize," Bustria said, "That's what outlying shops are all about – we help each other.

Understanding the importance of being behind the scenes and on the support end of things keeps Bustria and the rest of the team motivated to continue improving their role in the mission.

'For me, learning, training and fixing trucks ... You get a sense of accomplishment every day," he said. "There won't be airplanes taking off if we don't have these refuelers - the flightline would shut down if we didn't have any fuel."

JASDF student graduates NCOA

1/8/2018 — Every day, Team Kadena strives to build and improve relations with their partners in the Japan Air Self-Defense Force. Whether it's through joint training operations in the field or bilateral exchange programs in the classroom, the two militaries work side-by-side to foster a stronger, more cohesive partnership

On Dec. 21, 2017, Self-Defense Force Tech. Sgt. Masaaki Hayakawa, 701st Squadron, Special Airlift Group, helped build partnerships between the JASDF and U.S. Air Force by graduating from Kadena's noncommissioned officer academy.

During NCOA, students attend a six-week course that covers leadership challenges, public speaking, management tactics, marching and building partnerships as a class.

"I've had a very fun experience going through the course," Hayakawa said. "My classmates have been very helpful and are good to me."

Hayakawa said his biggest challenge during the course was the language barrier, but he was able to overcome that with the help of his instructor and classmates.

"One of the biggest challenges I had to overcome as an instructor is communication," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Brandon Wolf, Erwing Professional Military Education instructor. "As a teacher, I want to make sure that all of my students succeed."

Wolf said his first worry in teaching an international student was about all of the students getting along and accepting each other. The goal is to naturally promote a bilateral partnership, so positive relationships among the students was vital.

"They welcomed him with open arms and they really made my job easy," Wolf said. "Masaaki did very well in class. The traditional Japanese communication style is a lot different than how we would do a presentation

in the Air Force. I think it was a great learning experience for him to see how we operate and he adapted very well."

According to Wolf, the highlights of each PME class he teaches are watching the students bond, sharing their experiences and growing together over the six-week course.

"I had a meaningful experience of the course," said Hayakawa. "The instructors we're great and my classmates were very helpful. I hope to strengthen the relationship between the U.S. Air Force and the JASDF and that we can continue by exchanging more students."

12/20/2017 — When "the office" takes up nearly 6,000 acres, it's no stretch to claim being the largest. The 18th Munitions Squadron at Kadena Air Base, can say just that, occupying a large portion of the base and standing as the most expansive conventional munitions storage area in the Air Force.

Being as massive as the 18th MUNS is comes with challenges that the Airmen of Kadena Air Base must rise to meet.

"It's crazy high paced, but that's part of the fun," said Staff Sgt. Audrey MacKenzie, 18th MUNS stockpile supervisor. "The big operations are my favorite because it shows me more of the big picture. Things only get dull when it's slow, but that hardly happens here."

Slow or fast, when it comes to potentially volatile material, there is no room for error.


"Fitting everything into its storage area is like a giant puzzle with a weight-balancing component," said MacKenzie. "We have to be sure that only the same types of munitions go into storage together, old items are removed and replaced and we have to be careful with how and where things are stored. You can't skate by doing the bare minimum in ammo. Attention to detail is absolutely vital."

Even with the pressure of the 18th MUNS size, mission and dangers, the impact of the job isn't lost on the Airmen.

"I definitely enjoy what I do," said Senior Airman Roderick Harris, 18th MUNS munitions storage crew member. "We're the first stop in the chain when it comes to the weapons and countermeasures for the aircraft. Without MUNS, our jets wouldn't have what they need and that would mean total mission stop-

Showing pride and dedication in their work is part of what makes the 18th MUNS, where more than \$947 million worth of material is located, the go-to squadron for conventional munitions throughout the Pacific.

"It's definitely a unique experience working overseas on a mission of this scale," said MacKenzie. "I'm always looking forward to what comes next."



6-6 CAV builds collective readiness on the Korean Peninsula

12/19/2017 - SOUTH KOREA — As day breaks near the Bongsu Mountain in South Korea, a small team of highly trained operators emerges from the thick underbrush. In the chilly air, the team of 10, compromised of U.S. Air Force Combat Controllers and Republic of Korea Joint Fires Observers moves stealthily through the wood line, en route to their objective as AH-64D Apache Longbows from 6th Squadron, 6th Cavalry, 10th Combat Aviation Brigade, circle high overhead.

6-6 CAV, 320th Special Tactics Squadron, and Korean Army Joint Fires Observers completed Operation Teak Knife throughout November across South Korea in order to enhance Joint U.S. Army and Republic of Korea Army interoperability and build combat power.

This unique exercise is a critical step in strengthening ties between the RoK Army and U.S. Armed Forces. Korean Combat Controllers, who are certified as U.S. Joint Fires Observers spent weeks training, readying for this capstone event known simply as "Teak Knife."

The 320th Special Tactics Squadron, based at Kadena Air Base, Japan, led the

teams through the exercise. As the field portion of the training got underway, the teams sought to confirm the security of their infiltration zone from where they would control the air assets once they arrived on station. After completing this objective, the U.S. Soldiers and Korean Soldiers gathered to discuss their plan and set up their security posture.

Overlooking the Yedang Lake in front of Bongsu Mountain, the Soldiers began to search for any signs of enemy activity. Their primary concern was the elimination of any enemy air defense assets.

Shortly after beginning the search, the teams identified three enemy air defense systems placed in boats on the lake.

Not long after their discovery of the enemy, AH-64D Apache Longbows from the 6th Squadron, 6th Cavalry Regiment arrived on station. As with all of their previous rehearsals and pre-coordination, the RoK Army controllers took command of the aircraft after receiving their checkin briefs with continued assistance from their 320th STS counterparts.

Despite not being native English speakers, the RoK controllers trained hard on mastering the tenets of the standard call-for-fire terminology in training with

the 320th STS in the garrison environment prior to coming to the field. This training was key to enabling their effective communication with U.S. assets, like the Apaches, during the execution phase of Teak Knife.

According to Capt. Michael McConville, of Charlie Troop, 6-6 Cavalry (Commanding) Teak Knife's lead planner, "Using common JFIRE brevity allowed the aircrews to quickly detect, identify, and (notionally) prosecute targets handed over from RoK JFOs."

This interoperability is key considering the importance of the RoK-U.S. alliance and the frequency with which these units work together.

Once reporting the notional air defense assets up to their chain of command, their headquarters approved a firing mission, prompting the RoK controllers to direct the Apaches onto the notional targets in order to destroy them.

This exercise demonstrated the ability of RoK forces to talk U.S. assets onto notional targets using the latest in highly sophisticated technology.

Using calls for fire with grid areas and also utilizing equipment like Ground Laser Target Designators (GLTD), the RoK ground forces demonstrated the capability to communicate and operate effectively with the Apaches.

Once in receipt of the target, the Apaches engaged the notional air defense assets and successfully destroyed the enemy targets.

"Working with 320th STS and their RoK JFO counterparts was a unique and rewarding training experience," McConville said. "We were able to further build shared understanding and common TTPs that will make us more discriminately lethal on a combined division maneuver battlefield."

Exercises like these are critical in building the confidence of both ground and air forces for future training and real-world events.

According to Lieutenant Jo Joon-won, RoK Army, Joint Fire Observer, "Through training, we were able to improve the ROK-U.S. Combined Forces' ability to carry out combined operations."

This capability will continue to be of extreme importance in building readiness to Fight Tonight.

As for the future of training events such as Teak Knife, Capt. McConville shared, "We hope to continue to build upon our great relationship with the RoK ground forces."







Marine awarded for rescuing four Okinawans from rip tide

1/8/2018 - CAMP SCHWAB, Okinawa — A Marine was awarded the nation's highest medal for non-combat heroism during a ceremony on Camp Schwab, Okinawa, Jan. 8, for courageous actions

1st Lt. Aaron Cranford, a supply

officer with Headquarters and Service Company, 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion, 3rd Marine Division, was awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Medal for saving three divers and a local Okinawan who were caught in a rip current during a recreational dive at Onna Point, Okinawa on April 23, 2017.

Cranford surfaced from a 35-minute

dive and noticed three distressed divers caught in a surf zone about to be swept out to sea by a rip current.

After he ensured his dive group had reached a safe point to exit the water, Cranford returned to the surf zone at risk to his own life to begin rescuing the divers one by one.


"I could definitely tell that the divers were in distress," said Cranford, a native of Fort Worth, Texas. "Their gear was not the way it should have been and they were waving their arms back and forth trying to get people's attention."

One local Okinawa said he believes he wouldn't be alive today without Cranford's help.

"I just knew I was going to die," said Okinawa City, Okinawa native, Justin Kinjo. "My leg was stuck, I couldn't get any air and as soon as I reached the surface, the waves pushed me back in – knocking my [air] regulator out of my mouth."

For his courageous actions, Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Robert B. Neller awarded Cranford the highest non-combat decoration for heroism.

"1st Lt. Cranford is a superb representative of the United States Marine Corps," said Maj. Gen. Craig Q. Timberlake, the commanding general for 3rd Marine Division. "His actions took a lot of guts and a lot of courage. He reflects a United States Marine does."

Blended Military Retirement System to take effect Jan. 1

12/21/2017 - WASHINGTON — One of the most wide-reaching and significant changes to military pay and benefits over the last 70 years goes into effect Jan. 1, 2018, with the implementation of the Uniformed Services Blended Retirement System, known as BRS.

The new system blends aspects of the traditional defined benefit retirement pension system, with a defined contribution system of automatic and matching government contributions through the Thrift Savings Plan.

All new entrants into the uniformed services on or after Jan. 1, will be enrolled in this new retirement system, Pentagon officials said. The uniformed services are the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Public Health Service Commissioned Corps and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Commissioned Officer Corps.

Some Can Choose Between Systems

Nearly 1.6 million current service members will have the option to remain in the current legacy "high-3" retirement system or to choose the BRS when the opt-in period for eligible service members opens Jan. 1. Opt-in eligible service members from all seven of the uniformed services will have an entire year to make their retirement system election. The open period for the majority of service members is from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31, 2018.

Service members will need to visit one of these designated resources to opt into RDC.

- Army, Air Force, Navy: MyPay (https://mypay.dfas.mil).



- Marine Corps: Marine Online (https://www.mol.usmc.mil).
- Coast Guard, NOAA Commissioned Corps: Direct Access (https://portal. direct-access.us).
- U.S. Public Health Service personnel should contact the USPHS Compensation Branch.

Service members who believe they are eligible to opt in, but do not see the optin option available online should contact their local personnel/human resources office to verify eligibility, officials said.

Decision Irrevocable

The decision to opt in is irrevocable, officials emphasized, even if a service member changes his or her mind before the Dec. 31, 2018, deadline. Eligible service members who take no action will remain in the legacy retirement system, they added.

Prior to opting in, officials recommend that service members take advantage of all available resources to assist in making an informed decision on the financial implications specific to their retirement situation. The Defense Department endorses several training and informational tools to support a service member's decision, including the BRS Opt-In Course, the BRS Comparison Calculator and numerous online BRS resource materials. Service members can receive no-cost, personal support from an accredited personal financial manager or counselor available at their installation's military and family support center or by calling Military OneSource at 1-800-342-9647.

U.S. Navy aircraft joins search and rescue efforts for missing mariners in East China Sea

Commander, U.S. 7th Fleet Public Affairs 1/7/2018 — On Jan. 7, the U.S. Navy sent a P-8A aircraft attached to the 'Fighting Tigers' of Patrol Squadron EIGHT (VP-8) to

assist in an international search and rescue (SAR) effort in the East China Sea following a collision between two commercial vessels.

After arriving on scene, the aircraft searched an area of approximately 3,600 square nautical miles before returning to

Kadena Air Base. None of the mariners were located.

Chinese-flagged cargo ship, CF Crystal; and Iranian-owned and -operated, Panamanian-flagged MV Sanchi; collided Jan. 6. International search efforts are ongoing for MV Sanchi's 32 missing crew members.

How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG.

You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. 


