The first competitors that raced through Gate 2 were greeted with cheers and signs of encouragement.

Team Kadena has opened its gates for the event since 1993. When the 1st Okinawa Marathon was held, the communities around base, to include the American community supported the event in an effort to strengthen community relations.

2/15/2018 — Media agencies visited Kadena Air Base February 12-14, to learn about Kadena's mission. Visitors included members from Defense News, based in Washington, D.C., and members from NHK, Japan's public broadcasting station.

"With the wide variety of missions and units here, we can show people who don't normally get to see this what it is like at a busy air base," said Jeff Martin, Defense News reporter.

During their visit, the agencies were able to see the 733rd Aircraft Mobility Wing, the 353rd Special Operations Group, the 909th Air Refueling Squadron, the 33rd Rescue Squadron, the 44th Fighter Squadron, and the 67th Aircraft Maintenance Unit.

"Kadena has a very diverse mission

set," said 1st Lt. Katy Blessing, 18th Wing Public Affairs media operations section chief. "We were able to showcase all of these missions to Defense News to show their readers and followers what Kadena is doing to support the Pacific Air Forces, and to support the Air Force in their mission."

Visits by outside media give an opportunity for a different perspective of the mission at Kadena and allows a better understanding for military families and civilian counterparts. Opening the Air Force world to those outside counterparts, it also allows a stronger partnership going forward for telling the Air Force, and the Kadena story.

"Visits allow us to actually see these missions take place and where they happen, as well as talk face to face with the operators," Martin said. "We also get a chance to understand things from the Airman's perspective."

When telling Kadena's story, it's often from one set of eyes - that of the military member themselves. By having an outside source come and tell Kadena's story however, it allows another benefit that isn't overly apparent - understanding what someone perceives of the base, our operations, and even the Air Force as a whole.

"Public Affairs can tell the Air Force's story all day long," Blessing said. "To have a third-party come in and see what we're doing and be able to report on that, give a more balanced view in the opinion of a lot of our readers, I think it helps lend us credibility."

While the purpose of the visit may have been to get footage and stories for our outside counterparts, all parties enjoyed the visit and came away sharing ideas and stories and hoping to have another visit in the future.

2/15/2018 — Ever wonder how aircraft parts get shipped out from the base? The 18th Logistics Readiness Squadron Traffic Management Office ships out any cargo that needs to be sent from units on Kadena Air Base to other installations. Whether it's for resupply or repair, TMO outbound will get it there.

"It could be the smallest of objects," said Staff Sgt. Jamaal Witherspoon, 18th Logistics Readiness Squadron NCO in charge of water port. "Anything from nails and screws, to aircraft engines and propellers."

Despite the ability to ship even the

smallest of nuts and bolts, according to Witherspoon, the majority of the items shipped through the TMO outbound section are for repairs.

"We ensure that parts are being shipped quickly and efficiently to ensure that units around the Air Force are able to complete their mission," said Senior Airman Garrett DeLoach, 18th LRS outbound freight journeyman.

Before any cargo is shipped out, Airmen from TMO outbound verify the asset, inspect the item for damage, and then prepare the cargo for the appropriate transportation, even constructing custom boxes and packaging if need be. TMO also prepares the items and ships according to classification levels.

These procedures are generally used during day-to-day operations. However, the procedure changes when handling classified material.

"There is an extensive process when handling classified material," Garrett said. 'We have to check to ensure the deliverers are qualified to transport the cargo, ensure our personnel are trained and have the proper clearance and verify everyone that is going to handle it at any point is certified."

The outbound section of TMO supports more than just Kadena. A key part of their mission is to also support military installations and units around the globe, including units that are deployed, explained Witherspoon. Anything that is shipped from Kadena can affect a mission's outcome, ensuring that what needs to be sent out is properly packaged and ready to go, is critical.

Despite being so far from the U.S., Kadena Air Base has facilities that are capable of servicing, supplying and repairing equipment that make an impact on the U.S. Air Force's mission in the Pacific and also the entire globe.

'Instead of waiting for something to be repaired or replaced from the states, it could be more efficient to send that cargo from here instead," Garrett said. "The cargo we send can make the difference between mission success or mission failure."

The medical personnel simulated en-route care procedures, focusing on familiarizing and expanding joint interoperability of patient evacuation from the point of injury on the battlefield to advanced medical care at a Role Two field hospital.

Navy Lt. Sarah Handy, the simulation department head for 3rd Medical Battalion, said this course will help combat readiness in preparation for real-world scenarios. She said it shows Army and Air Force personnel the capabilities and limitations the Navy has, in order to organize further progression of care for critically-wounded individuals.

The training took place on MCAS Futenma as well as Torii Station over the course of two days. The training included treating simulated casualties with gunshot wounds, burns and shattered limbs.

Handy said this training is especially necessary for working with the Air Force critical care transport teams (C-CAT).

She said the C-CAT teams pick up the patients after the patients complete the initial round of advanced trauma care through the Role Two medical hospital.

A Role Two medical facility treats casualties with traumatic battlefield or industrial injuries and stabilizes them for transfer to medical facilities that offer a higher echelon of care. During the demonstration, a shock-trauma platoon demonstrated initial trauma care for two simulated casualties, treating them for injuries and illnesses like hypothermia before loading them into an ambulance and transporting them to a waiting CH-53 Super Stallion.


Inside the aircraft, Navy medical personnel outlined the various procedures

involved in caring for patients during air transportation, including ensuring the correct amount of medication is brought with the team on the aircraft to last the duration of the flight, as well as monitoring blood pressure and heart rate. Altitude during the flight is also a consideration for the medical teams as it could impact the patient's oxygen levels, which is specifically concerning for those patients receiving oxygen artificially.

"My favorite part was using the equipment I don't get to use very often," Handy said. "I can read and learn out of a manual or off of a PowerPoint, but this is hands on, doing the work with your feet in the dirt; this is my favorite part."

















# New policy cracks down on force deployability

a "higher expectation" of deployability by its forces, Defense Secretary James N. Mattis said, Feb. 17.

Speaking with reporters on a return flight from Germany to Washington, the secretary said the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness last week defined a problem that initially was brought to his attention by the Army, where "many non-deployables were on

their rolls."

Aside from combat-injured personnel who are in a separate category, Mattis said, the issue concerns service members "who are, just for one reason or another, not able to deploy with their units. It was a significant number, and the Army brought their concerns forward. The other services also highlighted [their] concerns."

#### **New Policy**

DoD's office of personnel and readiness has "come out with a policy that if you're not deployable for a year or more, you're going to have to go somewhere else," he said.

As an example, Mattis said, if 10,000 troops out of 100,000

are not deployable, that means 90,000 deploy more often to meet the same deployment standard.

"That's unfair," he said.

The secretary talked about a service member who is on his sixth deployment in 11 years.

"When that sort of thing happens, that brings sharply into focus that some people are carrying more than the share of the load that I want them to carry," he said.

"They need time at home," Mattis emphasized. "They need time with their families. We may enlist solders, [but] we re-enlist families. That's the way it is. If you can't keep the family together, then you're either going to lose the family or you're going to lose the soldiers, and that's a net loss for our society and for our military. [We] put a lot of training into people nowadays. So that policy is now out."

### Military Must Be Deployable

The secretary said as he reviewed the services' policies, they were already strong enough, "so some of this may simply be more adherence to the current policy that we have; some of it may require an effort within the DoD, the Office of Secretary of Defense policy, that

we put out for the department now," he added.

"But the bottom line is, we expect everyone to carry their share of the load," the secretary said, adding, "and sometimes things happen. People bust their legs in training or they're in a car accident. We understand that."

But DoD comprises a deployable military, which is a lethal military that aligns with its allies and partners, he said.

"If you can't go overseas [and] carry a combat load, then obviously someone else has got to go. I want this spread fairly and equitably across the force."

The only exemption is for those who have been injured in combat, he noted.

"If they were wounded in combat, and they want to stay in and they've lost their leg or something like this, and they can't be a paratrooper anymore, then we'll find a place to use them. That's a special category. They've earned that special status," Mattis said.

"Otherwise, you're either deployable, or you need to find something else to do. I'm not going to have some people deploying constantly, and then other people who seem to not pay that price to be in the U.S. military," he said.


level with our friends and allies."

#### How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a

complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. 
