3/7/2018 — The success of the United States Army is aided by consistent improvement in warfighting equipment. As a forward deployed Patriot Missile Battalion, the 1st Battalion, 1st Air Defense Artillery Regiment (1-1 ADA) continues to protect the force and selected assets from air and missile attack. The addition of the Dismounted Patriot Information Coordination Central (DPICC) increases the Battalion's ability to perform command and control of four firing Batteries currently located on Okinawa.

The DPICC directs identification and engagement orders to subordinate Patriot Batteries. The DPICC provides the ability to relocate the Battalion's Information Coordination Central tactical weapons control system from a vehicle into a collection of transportable cases. This provides the same capabilities of the mounted system, but enables flexibility and maneuver options for Battalions with expeditionary missions.

"Beyond the great capability the DPICC provides to our mission, one of the best aspects of the fielding was the support we received from the higher levels of the United States Army and industry partners," said Maj. Patrick Snyder, 1-1 ADA Executive Officer. "The assistance provided by the Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC) Capabilities

Manager, as well as the fielding team that Raytheon brought forward with the equipment ensured that we were able to seamlessly integrate this great capability."

In order to validate the capabilities of the DPICC, the Battalion utilized a "crawl, walk, run" approach to training. The Battalion executed various exercises involving their Tactical Operations Center, battle staff, and Battery Command Posts in preparation for an upcoming Battalion wide field training exercise.

"We received the DPICC before the

associated manning could be provided, and sourced our crews internally," said Maj. Juan Remy, 1-1 ADA Operations Officer. "Bringing great Soldiers forward from the batteries and training them to direct fires at the battalion level has been challenging, but definitely has shown us the quality of Soldiers we are lucky to work with on the 'Snake Eyes' team."

As the DPICC integrates into the daily battle rhythm, 1-1 ADA continues to spearhead the defense of Japan in the Pacific Theatre.

"As the Battalion transitions focus from a purely defense of Okinawa to the defense of key assets throughout the Pacific area of responsibility, the DPICC is key to our mission," said Lt. Col. Neal Lape, 1-1 ADA Battalion Commander. "Being the first Army unit to receive the DPICC from production clearly signifies the unique mission our Battalion has. Instead of having to fight in a consolidated footprint, the DPICC allows our Battalion to disperse, with no loss to command and control."

U.S., Indonesian air forces kickoff exercise Cope West 2018

3/12/2018 - MANADO AIR BASE, Indonesia — Exercise Cope West 2018 (CW18), a Pacific Air Forces-sponsored, bilateral exercise involving the U.S. and Indonesian air forces officially kicked off March 12, with an opening ceremony held at the at Sam Ratulangi International Airport, Indonesia.

CW18 is designed to advance interoperability and build upon already established partnerships between U.S. military forces and Indonesian air forces. The exercise will afford both countries the opportunity to exchange techniques in aircraft generation and recovery, close air support training and air-to-air fighter training, combat search, and rescue, and play host to a subject-matter expert exchange in aircraft maintenance.

"Over the next two weeks more than 250 Airmen from our air forces will exchange tactics, techniques, and procedures (TTPs) for conducting aerial combat," said U.S. Air Force Col. Jason Cockrum, Cope West 18 exercise director. "This exchange extends from our pilots, maintainers, support personnel, and special operators."

Approximately 110 U.S. personnel will participate in the exercise along with approximately 150 service members from the Indonesian air force. The exercise will involve approximately 12 aircraft, including U.S. Air Force F-16C/D Fighting Falcon from the 13th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron, 35th Fighter Wing based out of

Misawa Air Base, Japan, and F-16 fighters from the Indonesian air force as well as Airmen from the 353rd Special Operations Group assigned to Kadena Air Base.

"This will also be the first time Indonesian and U.S. Air Force Special Operations Forces will integrate into Cope West, they will be performing Joint Military Free Fall training and Ground Tactical Air Control operations," said Cockrum.

Cope West is a recurring exercise that has occurred since 1989. This year will also mark the second time that U.S. fighter aircraft training has taken place in Indonesia in two decades and the sixth time Cope West has been hosted in Indonesia.


"I enjoy studying history, and especially aviation history, being part of Cope West is very exciting to me. The history of modern combat aviation can trace many of its roots back to this region of the world," said Cockrum. "More than 80 years ago, Gen. Douglas MacArthur used airpower to accomplish his island-hopping campaign through Southeast Asia. This was an aviation first, today we look back on this effort as the initial foundation for conducting multi-domain joint operations, now it's a capability that our Airmen provide around the world on a constant basis."

U.S. forces routinely conduct operations, exercises and training missions with other countries in the Pacific. These regional engagements are focused on improving interoperability and familiarization with allies and partners to safeguard the freedom of the seas and overflight in international airspace, deter conflict and coercion, and promote regional stability.

"The seeds that we sow over the next two weeks during Cope West, are critical to bearing the fruits of strong defense partnership that will promote security, stability and uphold a free and open Indo-Pacific region," added Cockrum.





Carl Vinson Strike Group Public Affairs 3/13/2018 - SOUTH CHINA SEA — The Carl Vinson Strike Group began a bilateral exercise with the Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF), March 11, during a regularly scheduled deployment in the Western Pacific.

Aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) and destroyer USS Wayne E. Meyer (DDG 108) are conducting combined operations with Japanese destroyer JS Ise (DDH 182) to enhance maritime interoperability between longstanding allies.

"Strong maritime partnerships maintain security, stability and prosperity, which the Indo-Pacific region has enjoyed for more than 70 years," said Rear Adm. John Fuller, the strike group commander. "Collaborating with a close maritime partner promotes regional cooperation."

As part of the exercise, four JMSDF liaison officers have embarked Carl Vinson to support combined operations.

The operations will include formation steaming as well as anti-submarine and air-defense training. Ise will also conduct a replenishment-at-sea with Carl Vinson.

The 646-foot Japanese destroyer displaces 18,000 tons and sails with three Y (60 K/J) helicopters. The ship's primary missions include anti-submarine warfare, mine countermeasure, logistics, and search and rescue.

The Carl Vinson Strike Group also includes Carrier Air Wing 2 and a compliment of more than 70 aircraft, Destroyer Squadron 1 and guided-missile destroyer USS Michael Murphy (DDG 112).

Michael Murphy conducted a passing exercise with the French frigate FNS Vendemiaire while operating in the Western Pacific and South China Sea in January and February. Sailors practiced communication and shiphandling techniques.

The strike group completed a historic port visit to Vietnam, March 9, which marked the first time an aircraft carrier visited in more than 40 years.



The chapel, which was used as an auditorium for large military gatherings, briefings and command functions returned to providing one of its primary services - ministry and sharing the word of God.

Through the vision and dedicated hard work of 10th Support Group Chaplain, Maj. Edward Harris and support from fellow Army Chaplains Capt. David Clement, 1st Battalion 1st Air Defense Artillery, Capt. Alfred Matthews, 1st Battalion 1st Special Forces Group and members from the Army community, Soldiers on Okinawa can now take part in services and sermons by their own Army Chaplains right here on Torii Station.

"This building is a sense of pride for the Army chaplains here on Okinawa and resuming services upholds a long standing tradition of spiritual support for the Army community. For the Soldiers and people that work with the tenth, the feeling is mutual. For our Army community, resuming services is like we are coming home and have an Army place to worship," said Harris.

Harris explained that due to budgetary constraints, ministry services at the Torii Chapel were unfortunately curtailed. Upon conducting further research and talking to the community on Torii Station, he found that what they wanted were religious resources they could connect with, in the Army language. By restarting services with a new vision and direction, the Torii Chapel is able to fill this void felt by the Army community.

There are about 40 people within the chapel group who are "core" members. In addition to providing music and supporting weekly services, they hold fellowship dinners every Sunday night for anyone who wants to attend and coordinate outreach programs.

The group is currently exploring ways to expand services, plan a vacation bible

school, implement date night programs and mission trips for single Soldiers and enhance community relations with our host community by sponsoring on base events.

The Torii Station Chapel currently holds non-denominational services every Sunday from 1700 – 1800 followed by a fellowship dinner until 1900.

"I'd like to welcome everyone in the community to our chapel. The larger Army community on Okinawa, the single Soldier, family members, those who work on Torii Station and those who have access to the base. We will feed you physically, spiritually and emotionally," said Harris.

The Torii Chapel will also be holding an Easter Sunset Service at Torii Beach on April 1 beginning at 1600 hours. The event will feature an Easter egg hunt for kids, a service on the beach followed by a fellowship dinner at 1800 hours. All are welcome to attend. How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. The following changes or improvements to your TRICARE benefits apply for calendar year 2018: TRICARE Select will replace TRICARE Standard and TRICARE Extra on Jan. 1, 2018. TRICARE Select brings together the features of TRICARE Standard and TRICARE Extra in a single plan. Enrollees who obtain services from TRICARE network providers will pay lower cost sharing amounts for network care. All current TRICARE beneficiaries will be automatically enrolled in their respective plan on Jan. 1, 2018. TRICARE Prime plan enrollees will remain in their TRICARE Prime plan. TRICARE Standard and Extra beneficiaries will be enrolled in a TRICARE Select plan. Beneficiaries can choose to enroll in or change their TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select coverage during an annual open enrollment period in November-December, 2018 for coverage beginning on Jan. 1, 2019. For calendar year 2019, failure to enroll in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select results in the termination of coverage for civilian care. These beneficiaries who choose to not enroll may only receive care at a military clinic or hospital on a space available basis. IMPORTANT FACTS TO REMEMBER WHEN VISITING NETWORK PROVIDERS IN JAPAN



Be quiet. As Japanese people think a quiet environment is needed for patients, speaking loudly or laughing out loud could be frowned upon and perceived negatively. Always follow the rules of the provider, especially during an inpatient stay. For example, observing visiting hours and honoring lights off time.

Saying "Hello/Konnichiwa, Excuse Me/Sumimasen, Thank you/Arigato" are always appreciated by providers or just a simple bow would also work. Demonstrate respect for those you come in contact with.

Be mindful of where you can use your mobile phone. Your mobile phone should be set at "manner mode," meaning set on vibrate or silent. Talking on the mobile and/or use of your mobile phone may be restricted. All hospitals and clinics should have signs displaying rules and preferences. If you have other health insurance (OHI) including Japanese National Insurance (JNI), it must be declared using the OHI form available here: www.tricare-overseas.com/beneficiaries/claims/other-health-insurance. For JNI holders, please remember to take the card to the appointment. For all other beneficiaries with OHI (except JNI), please prepare to pay upfront and submit a claim for reimbursement.

Beneficiaries who do not receive cashless/claimless care must be prepared to pay upfront and submit a TRICARE DoD/CHAMPUS Claim Form - Patient's Request for Medical Payment (DD Form 2642) for reimbursement.

Self-payment is required for some items that are NOT covered by TRICARE. Examples of these items include: private room upon the beneficiary's request, meals, an extra bed for family or friends to stay with the patient, or certificates (birth/death). All cash payments will be collected at the counter (front desk). Not all providers accept credit card payment, especially for outpatient fees.

Remember to leave plenty of time to arrive to your appointment. The extra time will help you find a parking space and navigate to your scheduled appointment. Punctuality is key.

Do not be late for your medical appointment. If you arrive late, you cannot be seen by the provider right away, even with an appointment. If you need to cancel your appointment, notify International SOS or the provider as soon as possible. "No shows" can be one of the biggest causes of damaging a good relationship with providers in Japan.

Do not raise your voice or yell.

Do not point fingers at people.

Do not record or take photos in the hospital or clinic.
