

Honoring the fallen and healing the family

5/1/2018 - On February 17th, 2002, an Army MH-47 helicopter crashed into the Sulu Sea while conducting counterterrorist operations in the Philippines, killing 10 people, one of which was Master Sgt. William L. McDaniel II, a pararescueman with the 320th Special Tactics Squadron.

Two years later a professional development center on Kadena Air Base was dedicated in his memory and is now known as the McDaniel Center.

Nearly two decades later, his family was invited for an opportunity to see firsthand the dedication to their loved one and meet those who were involved.

While it may seem a little late, the timing was just right for his mother and niece to find closure and healing for their loss.

"I think it was just time," said Sheila McDaniel, mother of the fallen. "My granddaughter kind of pushed me a little bit to get this going so we could come and see this ... Maybe put a little bit of closure for me, for my son ... About him."

McDaniel was the first born son, and the only child to follow in the footsteps of his father by joining the military.

Upon finding out he was joining the military, Sheila had mixed emotions for her son, thinking back to a skinny little 13 year old boy.

"He decided to go in the Air

Force and yah, I was happy for him – nervous but happy," she said.

At a young age, McDaniel began to change his physical appearance – his dedication to fitness was a key factor in the confidence that could be seen in his work and a major contributor to his future successes.

After years of dedication as a crew chief he decided to cross-train to become a pararescueman – a challenge for anyone but possibly even more so for him.

"When he went into pararescue, he was the old man compared to the guys that were going through the pipeline at that time," Sheila said. "He was 31, 32, and those guys were 18, 19, 20 years old, and he was doing just what they were and then some."

For everyone who knew Mc-Daniel, it was clear he loved what he did, his mother explained, but was never boastful.

"He wouldn't have liked all this hoopla," she laughed, "He was not into that ... He became Pararescueman of the Year in 2001, and we never knew until he was killed – he never told."

As much as this trip was about the legacy of McDaniel, it was also about the healing of his family – many years later, the heartache is still there.

Sheila still remembers the moment she found out about her son's passing.

"When they first came to tell me, I felt like somebody had stuck me in the gut and just ripped half of me away," Sheila recalled. "As far as how I feel today ... I miss him very much – his smile, his sweetness, his kindness and beautiful face."

Being able to come to Okinawa, brought a sense of peace to his mother as well as the rest of the family.

Ashley McDaniel was 18 when her uncle, "Bub," died and is one of the key people behind getting her grandmother Sheila, here.

"I pushed for it, I pushed for her to be here because I felt like it would help her in a lot of ways," Ashley said. "To see how happy she is to be here, makes me happy – words don't describe it."

For Ashley, the visit has made dealing with her grief a little easier.

"To see what everybody has done to keep his memory alive is awesome," she said. "[It] makes it a little easier to deal with knowing that he's never been found but he's never been forgotten ..."

During their trip, Sheila and Ashley were able to sense just how much people cared – and still do – for McDaniel.

"I just get it from everybody, and that makes me feel wonderful to know he was loved that much," Shelia said.

The atmosphere of family and comradery made the trip better than expected for Ashley.

"It's been above and beyond – they're a part of our family – nothing will ever change that," she said. "They have absolutely

made us feel like family and we'll forever hang on to that."

Both Sheila and Ashley believe their loved one is looking down happily on their experience at Kadena. However, their emotions implore them to highlight the importance of valuing loved ones while they're still here.

"Tell them every day how much you love them," Sheila said through tears, "Because you're not promised the next day – ever."

Although the trip was a long time coming, it was still just as valued to the McDaniel family.

"We've never been able to see these things and be a part of what he was a part of, so to do it now, 16 years later ... I think had it been done years ago or now, it still would've been just as amazing – there hasn't been one bad part of this in any way," Ashley expressed.

As the visit comes to an end, Sheila leaves the island with one parting message.

"If I had anything to say to these guys here, it'd be to tell them they have made my heart happy – I will never forget what these guys have done," she said. "They've helped me in a way that I didn't realize that will help me move forward ... What they've done ... I will never be able to thank them enough and tell them what it's meant – doesn't make it go away, but it has helped tremendously."

18th WG CCCE's keep the mission going

4/26/2018 - Balancing a busy schedule is asked of anyone who puts on the uniform, but that schedule only gets busier as Airmen progress in rank. Once they've achieved a position at the base leadership level, they need another set of eyes to help manage their schedule - making sure their time is spent efficiently for the benefit of the base, and the Air Force.

Keeping the schedule free of conflicts for the top enlisted member at Kadena may be considered a fairly large task, and the team that handles the task is made up of just two Airmen - the Command Chief's Executive Assistants.

"The Command Chief's Executive Assistant is an integral part of the command staff and ensures all correspondence is in regulation and processed efficiently," said Tech. Sgt. Rachel Holmes, 18th Wing CCCE. "This office supports and relays the direction of the 18th Wing Command Chief through communication with unit leaders across the base."

While one may not find executive assistant on the job sheet at the local recruiter's office, it's a necessary position to keep the mission going, especially at a high-paced base such as Kadena. Whether it's the Airmen and their families, the sister services on the base or other countries who need the ear of base leadership, the executive assistants are there to make sure the requests are racked-and-stacked in importance so the CCC can execute their mission.

"The Command Chief's Executive Assistant manages and de-conflicts the Command Chief's daily agenda and business travel, supporting bilateral and multilateral engagement requests," said Tech. Sgt.



Robert Martin, 18th Wing CCCE. "We also have a large role in Air Force-level processes like the Developmental Special Duty vectoring and Joint Professional Military Education opportunities."

The position is unique in the fact that any Air Force Specialty Code can apply, Homes explained. It's a one-year commitment and is applied for at the unit-level. The CCC conducts interviews and selects the best Airmen to join the command team. While the CCCE's main priority is handling the schedule for the CCC, they're also responsible for functions that affect Airmen throughout the base, including many additional programs highlighting outstanding Airmen. They facilitate the recognition of deserving Airmen through quarterly and annual awards, Senior Airman Below the Zone, and Airmen of the Week, Martin explained.

With multiple hats worn at times, the CCCE's explain the best part of their job is

seeing the relationship between leadership on base and those serving under them. At the end of the day, taking care of leadership is the CCCE's main priority, but taking care of the Airmen and helping them be rewarded for their hard work may be the best pay-off for the demanding position.

"Our job is rewarding because we are able to witness the authentic appreciation this leadership team has for every single service member and civilian on Kadena Air Base," Holmes said.

5/8/2018 - What has two thumbs and orders more than 80,000 parts a year for the 18th Component Maintenance Squadron?

Staff Sgt. Melanie Marlow, 18th CMS NCO in charge of propulsion supply, has those two thumbs and places those orders as the only Airmen that owns that title. She is "on loan" from the 18th Logistics Readiness Squadron to help solve a problem many maintainers were facing.

"I'm the first person to ever hold this position," Marlow said. "I take care of everything that is ordered, issued and taken in within the propulsion shop and manage the largest bench-stock in the Pacific Air Force."

Prior to Marlow taking the position, six different sections within the 18th CMS were trying to coordinate all of their orders through different contacts in the 18th LRS. To cut back on the cost of transport and

countless man-hours, a logistics professional was needed.

"I manage a \$96 million program and order around 82,000 parts in a year," Marlow said. "It's a beast, but I really enjoy the experience. I've gained a lot of respect while filling this position and have even been able to mend some of the relationships between supply and maintenance that hadn't been so great."

The work Marlow has accomplished has not gone unnoticed within the 18th CMS.

"She's incredibly motivated



and self-driven," said Tech. Sgt. Robert Slovensky, 18th CMS NCO in charge of support. "Once we let her know what we need, she gets it done and is, basically, the best thing since sliced bread."

The position is temporary, though. With Marlow having served in the position for 18

months, she is preparing to rejoin the 18th LRS within a year.





TRICARE® OVERSEAS PROGRAM





DO

Be quiet. As Japanese people think a quiet environment is needed for patients, speaking loudly or laughing out loud could be frowned upon and perceived negatively. Always follow the rules of the provider, especially during an inpatient stay. For example, observing visiting hours and honoring lights off time.

Saying "Hello/Konnichiwa, Excuse Me/Sumimasen, Thank you/Arigato" are always appreciated by providers or just a simple bow would also work. Demonstrate respect for those you come in contact with.

Be mindful of where you can use **your mobile phone.** Your mobile phone should be set at **"manner mode,"** meaning set on vibrate or silent. Talking on the mobile and/or use of your mobile phone may be restricted. All hospitals and clinics should have **signs displaying rules** and preferences. You can download a useful guideline of **mobile usage rules** at Japanese medical facilities here: **www.emcc-info.net/info/pubcom2/2608_5.pdf**

If you have other health insurance (OHI) including Japanese National Insurance (JNI), it must be declared using the OHI form available here: www.tricare-over-seas.com/beneficiaries/claims/other-health-insurance. For JNI holders, please remember to take the card to the appointment. For all other beneficiaries with OHI (except JNI), please prepare to pay upfront and submit a claim for reimbursement.

Beneficiaries who do not receive cashless/claimless care must be prepared to pay upfront and submit a TRICARE DoD/CHAMPUS Claim Form - Patient's Request for Medical Payment (DD Form 2642) for reimbursement.

Self-payment is required for some items that are NOT covered by TRICARE. Examples of these items include: private room upon the beneficiary's request, meals, an extra bed for family or friends to stay with the patient, or certificates (birth/death). **All cash payments** will be collected at the counter (front desk). Not all providers accept **credit card payment**, especially for outpatient fees.

Remember to leave plenty of time to arrive to your appointment. The extra time will help you find a parking space and navigate to your scheduled appointment. Punctuality is key.

DON'T

Do not be late for your medical appointment. If you arrive late, you cannot be seen by the provider right away, even with an appointment. If you need to cancel your appointment, notify International SOS or the provider as soon as possible. "No shows" can be one of the biggest causes of damaging a good relationship with providers in Japan.

Do not raise your voice or yell.

Do not point fingers at people.

Do not record or take photos in the hospital or clinic.

4/26/2018 - Every career field can have it's highs and lows, and for some there's much more to gain than just knowing how to do the job efficiently. Often, a job can shape someone both personally and professionally creating a unique perspective on their role.

Maintaining the defensive systems of mission essential aircraft is a critical task. Tech Sgt. Joshua Dungan, electronic warfare systems craftsman with the 353rd Special Operations Maintenance Squadron at Kadena Air Force Base, has gained much more than job proficiency over his years in the career field.

Dungan wasn't exactly sure what he had signed up for when he told his recruiter yes for an electronic warfare job - ready to go, he eagerly accepted. On a daily basis, he's responsible for the preventative and corrective maintenance on the MC-130H Combat Talon II and MC130J Commando II model aircraft ensuring the defensive systems have up to date software and are functioning as needed – a very important part of the mission. Despite the significance of the job, Dungan does it with sureness.

"It's a serious business doing aircraft maintenance and obviously if you don't do something correctly it can have serious implications, but I'm never nervous to go out and do the job," he explained. "I've been trained on how to do it and I've done it for a long time so I'm confident going out there."

Years – and multiple airframe

models - later, he's now helping others excel at it.

"My favorite part of what I do is to pass on the knowledge to our younger Airmen so we can prep the future generation of EW troops that come out here to maintain the aircraft," Dungan said. "That's where I get most of my satisfaction – teaching others."

Although he is passing on knowledge to others, he still faces challenges himself.

"Sometimes we'll run across something that we haven't seen before – chasing that down and finding out how we're going to fix it is the most difficult part, but that's one of the best parts," Dungan said. "You start learning more about the systems you're maintaining so it makes you that much better for the future."

Learning opportunities are

something Dungan welcomes in his career as he is constantly working toward improvement.

"I'm always trying to better myself whether that's through education or working different airframes - learning not just from other EW troops but some other specialists on these aircraft," he explained. "I always try to go out there and learn what they can do just to make myself a better maintainer in general."

Aircraft maintenance isn't the only thing Dungan has learned – being in the Air Force has taught him the importance of leadership.

"I was told once that being a leader isn't just being a leader in one thing in particular ... a leader is a leader everywhere," Dungan said, "Different roles such as being an electronic warfare craftsman, a father, a brother, or a son ... leadership can fit into all those roles."

For Dungan, being a leader, teaching others and understanding the role he plays in the mission are all things that bring him personal and job satisfaction, but at the end of the day, seeing other's succeed is what matters most to him.

"My biggest accomplishment is to see my troops succeed and to see them going there and seeing the things that they've learned and the things that I taught them - that they're putting that to good use and that they're out there getting the job done," he said. "It lets me know that I'm doing my job and it's almost a sense of pride to see them go off on their own and take care of business."

4/30/2018 - Eighty volunteers from Kadena Air Base showed up early to help better the community outside of Gate 2.

The Airmen showed up for a week-

"It's really important to me because I feel like I have a relationship with some of the people out here in the local community," said Staff Sgt. Airmen, jets return from Japan deployment

5/7/2018 — HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah - Airmen and F-35A aircraft from the active duty 388th Fighter Wing and Reserve 419th Fighter Wing returned here May 4-5 following a six-month deployment to Kadena Air Base, Japan.

Families gathered on the flightline to welcome the pilots, maintainers, and support personnel who had been working at Kadena and the surrounding region since October 2017. The deployment was part of a routine "theater security package" that demonstrates continuing U.S. commitment to stability and security in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region.

This marks the first long-term overseas deployment for the

F-35A, which first arrived at Hill AFB in 2015 and was deemed "combat ready" by the Air Force one year later. The 388th FW and 419th FW fly and maintain the jet in a Total Force partnership, which capitalizes on the strengths of both the active duty and Reserve components.

"They accomplished a lot," said Col. Regina Sabric, 419th FW commander. "The biggest thing with being the first operational F-35 theater security package, it sets the playbook for every other operational wing to follow."

While deployed, pilots flew 1,086 sorties and deployed an additional eight times from Kadena to other locations in the region. Personnel worked with other U.S. Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corp aircraft and the Japanese Self Defense Force and


Col. Lee Kloos, 388th FW commander, said F-35 pilots gained valuable training with their joint and coalition partners,

and maintainers were able to get the jets back in the air quickly.

"This is the first [F-35] deployment of this magnitude and this duration," Kloos said. "The

jets performed great, it was an amazing performance."

Hill's fighter wings are home to 35 F-35s and will total 78 by the end of 2019.





Air Force directs one-day operational safety review

5/8/2018 — WASHINGTON - Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. David L. Goldfein directed all Air Force wings with flying and maintenance functions to execute a one-day operational safety review by May 21, 2018.

"I am directing this operational safety review to allow our commanders to assess and discuss the safety of our operations and to gather feedback from our Airmen who are doing the mission every day," said Goldfein.

After a series of recent aviation mishaps and fatalities, including a WC-130 Hercules crash May 2, the Air Force is taking swift action to ensure the safety of its force. Although safety statistics over the past decade show Air Force Class A and B aviation

mishaps trended downward, the Air Force's manned aviation mishap rate increased since the beginning of fiscal year 2018.

During the safety review, commander-led forums will gather feedback from Airmen who execute the Air Force's flying operations and challenge Airmen to identify issues that may cause a future mishap.

'We cannot afford to lose a single Airman or weapons system due to a mishap that could have been prevented," said Goldfein. "Our men and women have volunteered to give their last full measure for America's security. My intent is to have commanders lead focused forums with their Airmen to help identify gaps and seams that exist or are developing, which could lead to future mishaps or unsafe conditions."





How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. 

Mail Address Format

If included, the mail may be routed through the international postal system instead of the military postal system, which may result in a higher postage rate and longer transit time to the addressee.

Mailing of Alcoholic Beverages

Due to transportation safety concerns, please avoid mailing alcoholic beverages such as beer, wine or liquor through the US military APO/FPO mail system.

Mailing Lithium-ion Battery in the APO/FPO System

The mailing of lithium-ion batteries to and from a US military APO/FPO address is permitted when the batteries are properly installed in an electronic device. Because of safety concerns, defective lithium-ion batteries or lithium-ion batteries that are not installed in a device and instead packed alone or separate from the electronic device cannot be mailed. Lithium-ion batteries are typically used in devices such as mobile telephones, portable electronics and laptops.
