

NATO provides "eye in the sky" for RED FLAG

354th Fighter Wing Public Affairs 5/9/2018 - EIELSON AIR FORCE BASE, Alaska — The air war is underway at RED FLAG-Alaska 18-1. But fifty miles southwest and ten thousand feet above the dog fighting, a NATO E-3A Component jet circles in its flight pattern, soaking up signals and squawks about the fluid battle space below and providing friendly forces a watchful "eye in the sky" that extends in every direction for hundreds of miles.

As a NATO unit, Airmen from around the world work the rows of screens and scopes in the middle of the aircraft, their country's respective flag adorning their shoulders. Everyone stares intently at their screen, all of them sharing the common goal of identifying and calling out new targets as they appear on the scope. The mission crew is comprised of a surveillance team, a weapons team, and airborne technicians; they are responsible to the tactical director, who is the senior member of the mission crew.

A bearded German crew member from the weapons team keys the microphone with his foot and relays the details of a nascent threat to a friendly fighter, like an offensive coordinator spotting a hole in the defense. Minutes pass and the radio chatter continues. New targets are being spotted with greater frequency now, the scopes overflowing with enemy aircraft. And then the call happens; the first bogey is down. But this is no time to rejoice, as the air war rages on with increasing ferocity.

What makes the E-3A such a valuable component in the fight? The answer is that it's able to identify and track aircraft from a long range with the massive radome mounted atop the jet.

Capt. Noel Conrard, an air battle manager, makes this comparison: "Fighter jets are like looking through a straw, whereas the E-3A is able to gather information like water running through a firehouse."

The raw signals from the radome get piped into a useable computer interface on the scopes and screens that comprise the mission crew section. With this real time knowledge in hand, the weapons crew is then able to funnel this information down to the fighter jets, providing them enhanced situational awareness of both air and ground threats.

The NATO E-3A mission at RED FLAG-Alaska might sound simple: mitigate the losses of fighter jets from unreported ground and air threats. But the execution of this goal is anything but easy, as it requires the coordinated efforts of a multinational team—15 of the 28 NATO member nations are represented—working in near harmony between the flight deck and mission crew.

The most senior members of the mission crew have been working on the NATO E-3A for 30 years, while the most junior members have been assigned for a year or less. Yet all of these nationalities, backgrounds and experience levels are able to meld their skillsets and cultural idiosyncrasies into a cohesive team, a team that delivers responsive airborne early warning, battle management and command and control to its operational commanders.

"It starts with good training and having everyone working toward a common goal," said Staff Sgt. Ryan Goll, a radar technician. "Once you're qualified on that position you know 'this is my role.' So it's a combination of the training and doing we what we do everyday that makes it work seamlessly."

Maj. Gary Axley, the Deployment Commander for NATO AWACS at RED FLAG-Alaska, attributed the successful multinational environment to old fashioned mission preparation. "We spend a lot of time together in the simulator and training in the air. But exercises like Red Flag really push our situational awareness and ability to react in a high ops tempo."

Another reason the E-3A is able to provide effective command and control is through their use of "contracts" amongst the aircrew. With such a wide-ranging team at the tactical director's disposal, "contracts" is how they ensure everyone knows what they're responsible for in the heat of battle. "These contracts are so we know how to react in certain situations," said Axley. "Everyone knows what we are doing and when it gets really busy we just know what needs to be done."

The crew of the E-3A Component flew more than 4,000 miles from their home station in Geilenkirchen, Germany to attend Eielson's first Red Flag of 2018 and they were pleased with the training scenarios that awaited them.

"We want this integration piece and combined command and control with different assets," said 1st Lt. Bodo Walle, FA Fighter Allocator. "With our standing tasking in Europe, it's mainly small aircraft control without having all these assets being integrated. That was our training focus here and our main benefit for participating in Red Flag-Alaska."

A large part of the NATO E-3A mission is to provide surveillance in eastern Europe, but at RED FLAG-Alaska they are able to fully employ the aircraft's unique mission sets.

"When we are at home station [training] it's like a backyard football scrimmage; we just don't have as many players," said Conrard. "But at a large force exercise like RED FLAG-Alaska, it's like playing on a regular sized football field. We execute different tactics and integrate with more assets. It allows the E-3 to be used to the fullest extent of its capabilities."

RED FLAG-Alaska provides the type of training that is only replicable in real-life combat situations. "It's a really good example of the air-to-air component," said Goll. "Tracking enemy fighters and actually getting our communications gear jammed. This is more than your typical sortie or exercise; Red-Flag is the most realistic training you're going to get."

When all of these factors are combined with the sheer square mileage of the Joint Pacific Alaska Range Complex—which is about the size of Florida-NATO's E-3A is afforded the opportunity to "train the way you fight" in case they are ever

called upon to engage in a real world contingency or operation. The final piece that allows the aircrew to perform their mission is the high level of camaraderie amongst all of its personnel. "The opportunity to work with

our NATO military partners from so many backgrounds is fantastic," said Capt. Joe Dougherty, an E-3A Pilot. "The thing that makes an assignment is the people and having the chance to work with all the NATO partners

is a once in a lifetime experience." And after the air boss comes over the radio to conclude the fictitious battle for the morning, the tactical director begins to clear off and dismiss the assigned scopes and sections, powering down the computers as the E-3A makes its way back toward Eielson. A Belgium crew member walks past a U.S. service member, fist bumping him on the way by. "Nice job out there today," he says, "You did really well." They exchange a courteous nod and smile.

5/12/2018 - ILAGAN, LUZON, Philip**pines** — U.S. Air Force and Philippine Army engineers completed the construction of a two-classroom building at Alibagu Elementary School on May 5, the first engineering civic action program (ENCAP) site to finish construction during Exercise Balikatan.

Over one month of laying cinder blocks, pouring concrete, and mixing mortar in the sweltering Luzon heat paid off for the combined team of engineers

from 18th Civil Engineer Squadron out of Kadena Air Base and the Philippine Army's 513th Engineering Construction Battalion.

There are five ENCAP sites at various locations on the island of Luzon as part of the 34th iteration of Balikatan. Armed forces from the U.S., Philippines, Australia, and Japan worked tirelessly together to complete these projects ahead of schedule.

1st Lt. Jesse O'Connor, the 18th CES site officer-in-charge, attributed his site team's success to the cooperation between the different militaries.

"Working together, we were able to complete numerous [individual] tasks while working towards our unified objective," said O'Connor, 26, of Chicago, Illinois.

"Our Airmen and the Philippine troops formed one seamless team," said site foreman, Master Sgt. John Aguilar Munoz, with 18th CES, from Artesia, New Mexico. "We had daily discussions on the tasks to be completed and sought each other's guidance when problems arose."

The engineers of ENCAP site 2 were

able to hone their skills while learning new techniques from their respective counterparts.

"Balikatan" is a Tagalog word that means "shoulder-to-shoulder" or "sharing the load together". It captured the spirit of the exercise to showcase the combined efforts of the multinational forces to accomplish the engineering project.

We had cooperation, coordination, and trust in the Army and Air Force engineers," said Philippine Army Jaydie Bilaque, site 2 officer-in-charge for 513th Engineer Construction Battalion.







Special Agents' perseverance saves fellow Wingman's life

4/27/2018 - FAIRCHILD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash. — This is a prime example of Airmen taking care of another Airman who was not only a complete stranger, but one in desperate need of help.

On April 24, Air Force Office of Special Investigations rookie Special Agent Charles Woomer of Detachment 322 here discovered a posting on the Reddit. com social media message forum, where someone was asking about how their Serviceman's Group Life Insurance would pay out should "something" happen to them before they separated from the military in about a week.

The person wanted to make sure his family would be set up comfortably. The post had a concerning tone that SA Woomer was keen to pick up on as did others.

However, SA Woomer acted by bringing this information to detachment leadership. With SA Justin Collins' guidance, SA Woomer coordinated with both the Reddit and Google law enforcement services to positively identify the Airman who made the original post.

SA Woomer tracked down the Airman and immediately coordinated with the Airman's unit leadership at Ft. Gordon, Ga. The Airman's superintendent con-

tacted the Airman, who was scheduled to separate from the Air Force April 28, 2018, and confronted him about the post. The superintendent said the Airman confirmed he was the one who made the post and was in fact intending on hurting himself before the end of the week.

The Airman was taken to Dwight D. Eisenhower Medical Facility, Ft. Gordon, Ga., to receive the appropriate treatment

Tracking the Airman down proved to be more difficult than just dialing a phone number. April 25, was a non-duty day for the Airman's unit. SAs Woomer and Collins made approximately 25 phone calls before finally getting in contact with the superintendent who immediately notified his First Sergeant and went to the Airman's residence.

The Airman was previously diagnosed with depression and prescribed medication for it. He also made suicidal ideations in the past. He recently ran out of his medication which apparently caused him to revisit the idea of ending his life.

The Airman's spouse and command expressed their gratitude to SAs Woomer and Collins for intervening.

It's safe to say that SA Woomer's and SA Collins' efforts were directly responsible for saving this Airman's life. The Airman would have left behind a spouse and two children, ages 9 and 4.

10th SG(R) Soldiers teach resiliency skills to Kubasaki HS seniors

5/10/2018 - CAMP FOSTER Master Resilience Trainers

(MRT) from 10th Support Group (Regional) visited Kubasaki High School, Camp Foster April 23, 25 and 27 to conduct resiliency training for approximately 140 seniors.

The trainers held three, half day classroom sessions covering a myriad of concepts and skill sets designed to help the students better understand resiliency and develop mental, emotional, physical and behavioral toughness to help them overcome the challenges they may face after high school life. The training ended on the third day with all the seniors taking part in friendly competitive activities at a pep rally held in the school gymnasium.

This was the first time resiliency training was taught at Kubasaki High School and the first time for the U.S. Army MRT instructors to teach to high school students.

Staff Sgt. Katherine Johnson, a senior intelligence officer with 10th SG(R), explained that the skills taught to the students were tailored to meet their specific needs, without changing too much of the content.

"The biggest challenge we had in teaching resiliency to teenagers vice Soldiers was in the way we would talk and relate. As Soldiers, it's a lot easier for us to relate because being a Soldier is our everyday life. We have similar experiences and stories that we can share with one another, such as deployment and going to the field. We have common life experiences to use as examples," said John-

son. "With teenagers it's pretty different. Because MRT trainers are typically senior NCO's, they have a good five to six years since leaving high school. For most of us the gap is even wider, so there's a big difference in our experiences, the problems we face, how we communicate, how we relate, and how to get certain points across. We actually had to practice how we were going to instruct, talk to them and what kind of examples we were going to use."

Kubasaki High School Principal, Greg Mowen, explained that resiliency training was implemented to help students cope with the many unique challenges that military children face.

"It's a very stressful time for the kids, here in Japan. A vast majority of these kids are heading back to the states for schooling. Some



of them have never even lived in the states, they've been overseas their entire lives. There is some apprehension about moving there, living there and going to school there. There's already a sense of "I wonder what." My hope was that we would be able to equip our students with skills that they could apply to help

them reduce their stress levels, focus on resolving problems that may come up in their daily lives and live more happy and healthy lives as a result," said Mowen.

Mowen expressed his desire to hold resiliency training again next year for juniors and eventually have this training for all of the students at the school.





How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed

by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. Help is available: Call your Kadena IG office at 634-7622 for Maj. Sarabia or 634-1109 for Mr. Lovingood, or leave a message on the Kadena Fraud Waste & Abuse (FWA) Hotline at 634-0404.

Mail Address Format

If included, the mail may be routed through the international postal system instead of the military postal system, which may result in a higher postage rate and longer transit time to the addressee.

Mailing of Alcoholic Beverages

Due to transportation safety concerns, please avoid mailing alcoholic beverages such as beer, wine or liquor through the US military APO/FPO mail system.

Mailing Lithium-ion Battery in the APO/FPO System

The mailing of lithium-ion batteries to and from a US military APO/FPO address is permitted when the batteries are properly installed in an electronic device. Because of safety concerns, defective lithium-ion batteries or lithium-ion batteries that are not installed in a device and instead packed alone or separate from the electronic device cannot be mailed. Lithium-ion batteries are typically used in devices such as mobile telephones, portable electronics and laptops.

To help prevent non-delivery of mail, please enclose inside the mail piece the sender's address and the intended addressee. Enclosing the addresses inside the package can help the Postal Service route the mail to the addressee or returned to sender should the exterior addresses become unreadable or is separated from the mail piece. 

Okinawaetcetera?

SHEKWASHA, THE GREEN JEWEL FULL OF NUTRITION

Okinawa is not short on families who grow their own fruit in their gardens.

When walking around residential areas, the ones most likely to be seen are bananas, mangos, dragon fruit and guava. There is also papaya but instead of being a fruit, this is considered a vegetable in Okinawa and is either pickled or cooked.

When in Okinawa, it can be fun to take a stroll and discover fresh fruit in unexpected places, not just in private gardens but also on the streets where the Okinawan citrus fruit, Shekwasha, can be found.

When March arrives, the white flowers of the Shekwasha trees bloom all at once and when they reach full blossom, the mountains where they are grown turn completely white.



The harvest begins in late August and lasts for roughly half a year, until the end of February.

When ripe, the Shekwasha turn orange. However, in Okinawa they are harvested while still green and pressed to make fruit juice or used in cooking. As this fruit contains high levels of vitamin C and citrus acid, it is highly nutritious and is said to have the benefits of relieving fatigue, improving blood circulation and rejuvenating skin.
