

Strength of U.S.-Japan alliance showcased during COMPACAF visit

8/9/2018 - TOKYO, Japan — Air Force Gen. CQ Brown, Jr., Pacific Air Forces (PACAF) commander, met with U.S. and Japanese senior leaders here Aug. 6 and 7 as part of his first trip to the Indo-Pacific region as the commander.

Brown visited Japan to affirm the strength of the alliance and shared commitment to a free and open Indo-Pacific region, as well as to seek opportunities to enhance cooperation and coordination with the Japan Air Self-Defense Force (JASDF or Koku Jieitai).

"I'm excited to be back in the Pacific, to see firsthand the evolution that has occurred over the last decade," Brown said, who started his career at Kunsan Air Base, Republic of Korea, as a young lieutenant. While focused on operations in the Central Command Area of Responsibility in his most recent assignments, Brown served two tours in Korea, to include command of the 8th Fighter Wing, the "Wolf Pack," at Kunsan.

The Indo-Pacific region has grown increasingly complex since he was last here, and, more importantly, Brown emphasized that current challenges aren't isolated to any one area of the world.

"Those who choose to create challenges for other nations don't just stop in one region, they are seeking global impacts," he said, emphasizing what the National Defense Strategy calls "global disorder."

"The NDS calls on us to not only build a more lethal force, and concurrently, to strengthen our alliances and partnerships throughout the world, making visits like these and our daily efforts to increase our capabilities together ever more important," he continued.

Over the two-day visit, Brown met with Special Advisor to the Prime Minister Hiroto Izumi, Defense Minister Itsunori Ododera, Chief of Joint Staff Adm. Katsutoshi Kawano,

JASDF Chief of Staff Gen. Yoshinara Marumo and JASDF Air Defense Command (ADC) Commander Lt. Gen. Shigeki Muto. The general also met with U.S. Embassy officials and Lt. Gen. Jerry Martinez, U.S. Forces Japan and 5th Air Force commander, and members of his key staff.

While at the ADC, Brown observed a ballistic missile defense demonstration and visited with the Airmen responsible for the vital mission set, commenting on the precision of their work.

"Recent tensions have refined not only our readiness, but the readiness of our allies and partners throughout the region," Brown said, reminding us that "along with shared values and shared interests, we also share many of the same challenges, presenting great opportunities to continue to learn from and improve each other's capabilities."

Among those challenges includes an increase in Japanese intercepts of Chinese and Russian military aircraft operating in the region. That increase, however, has also created a proficiency the JASDF may share with other countries in the region to help respond to similar threats.

In addition to security concerns, discussions throughout the visit focused on opportunities to cooperate further in areas of fifth generation integration, ballistic missile defense, the employment of new operating concepts like PACAF's agile combat employment, and expanding to more multilateral exercises and engagements with like-minded nations in the region.

The JASDF received their first F-35As to Misawa in January, allowing for timely integration with not only the U.S. Marine Corps F-35Bs already in Japan, but also the U.S. Air Force F-35As forward-deployed at the time as part of a Theater Security Package to Kadena.

Both nations also affirmed the importance of and their shared commitment to continued participation in U.S. Indo-Pacific Command's Continuous Bomber Presence missions. Most recently six Koku Jieitai F-15s conducted bilateral training with B-52s deployed from Andersen Air Base, Guam, within the vicinity of Japan.

Brown also shared his appreciation for the cooperation and coordination that resulted in the rescue of the F-15 pilot who crashed in the waters south of Okinawa in June. The JASDF's quick response was vital in saving the pilot's life, and testament to the many rescue exercises that take place in the region.

"Not only does this validate bilateral coordination happening at all levels, but how important it is that we continue to work together so we are best prepared for any contingency," Brown said.

"The challenges we face are complex. However, I am confident in our abilities to work together, to build upon the cooperation that has existed between the U.S. and Japan for more than 60 years to ensure a

free and open Indo-Pacific." Kadena Air Base Weekly Newspaper



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PACAF takes entomology lessons learned to Sri Lanka

8/14/2018 - ANURADHAPURA, Sri Lanka — Pacific Air Forces (PACAF) medics conducted an entomology discussion with Sri Lankan civilian public health officials, entomologists, military doctors, and military public health officials during a four-day exchange as part of Pacific Angel (PAC ANGEL) 18-4 in Anuradhapura, Sri Lanka, Aug. 7-10.

The exchange, lead by U.S. Air Force Capt. Caroline Brooks, 18th Aerospace Medicine Squadron medical entomologist, focused on the importance of studying insects and controlling vector borne diseases.

"Vector borne diseases are on the rise," Brooks said. "Education on control and prevention has proven to be instrumental in helping combat infectious diseases."

According to the Center of Disease Control and Prevention, the dengue virus is a mosquito-borne, acute illness that is a major public health problem in the tropics and subtropics worldwide.

"It is important for us to ensure others are properly trained and knowledge is passed on to our personnel down the line," said Air Capt. Rahuman Booso, Sri Lanka air force doctor. "Entomology was chosen because dengue is on the rise throughout the country and the information presented will help us in developing practical solutions to combating this infectious disease."

About 400 million people are infected with the dengue virus each year, resulting in approximately 100 million becoming ill and causing around 21,000 deaths.

To combat the issue of vector borne diseases like dengue, Brooks, Booso and U.S. Air Force Maj. Vicki Charbonneau, 15th Aerospace Medicine Squadron public health officer, held a series of discussions, lectures and hands-on training.

"This exchange has given us an opportunity to share ideas and work together to prepare for potential disasters," Charbonneau said. "The cross flow of information is integral to our ability to operate together now and in the future."

PAC ANGEL 18-4 is helping foster partnerships between the U.S. and Sri Lanka through multilateral humanitarian assistance and civil military operations that promote regional cooperation and interoperability between military, civilian and nongovernmental organizations.

Hospital Gate open on Camp Foster

Marine Corps Installations Pacific **8/7/2018** - **CAMP FOSTER, Okinawa** — Camp Foster held a ribbon cutting ceremony signifying the opening of Gate 7 Aug. 7 on Camp Foster.

The gate was designed to improve accessibility to the U.S. Naval Hospital Okinawa for military personnel and their families.

"As the Camp Foster commander one of my responsibilities is taking care of the Marines, sailors and civilians that work and live on Camp Foster," said Marine Col. Vincent J. Ciuccoli, camp commander of Camp Foster. "They depend on several services, and one of the main ones is the U.S. Naval Hospital. Without that hospital and direct access to it, it would delay the services that are available to them."

Ceremony attendees included: Atsushi Sakima, mayor of Ginowan City; Navy Captain

Cynthia Kuehner, USNH Okinawa commanding officer; Navy Master Chief Petty Officer Dennis L. Hathorn, USNH Okinawa command master chief; and representatives from the Okinawa community.

Ciuccoli and Sakima spoke about the benefits of the newly opened gate.

The gate will help to improve the bond between the military community and the Okinawa residents, by providing better access to Ginowan City for Camp Foster personnel, according to Ciuccoli

"Just as important as the health and well-being of the Marines, sailors and civilians on Camp Foster is that of the health and well-being of the people of Okinawa," said Ciuccoli. "I believe that by having this kind of access in and out of the hospital gate we will be able to bolster the economic conditions and the commerce here in Ginowan City."

After the ceremony, a line

of cars waited to use the newly opened gate. Sakima was the first to exit the gate, waving as he left Camp Foster.



Revitalizing squadrons, Air Force outlines progress

8/10/2018 - **WASHINGTON** — Since Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. David L. Goldfein announced his initiative to revitalize squadrons, the assigned task force produced many visible changes and is moving forward with additional changes in an implementation plan.

"The squadron is the beating heart of the United States Air Force; our most essential team," Goldfein said in a letter to Airmen. "Our vision demands that 'squadrons be highly capable, expeditionary teams who can successfully defend our nation's interests in both today's and tomorrow's complex operating environments."

The task force conducted an Air Forcewide review, driven by Airmen in the field, to promote best practices and identify improvements. Consisting of Total Force Airmen from diverse backgrounds, they reviewed survey data and gathered inputs from across the Air Force through on-line crowd sourcing and face-to-face discussions with nearly 4,000 individuals, including spouses, from 25 different bases representing all major commands, Reserve and National Guard.

Along the way, the Air Force implemented improvements to include authorizations to rebuild the command support staffs, while addressing the manning for superintendents. Additionally, enlisted professional military education has been improved, performance report requirements have been removed for the rank of airman first class, computer-based and ancillary training requirements have been reduced, all based on the feedback from Airmen.

"This is incredibly humbling and exciting to be a part of because if we can get this right, we can hopefully impact the lethality and effectiveness of the entire Air Force," said Col. Russell Williford, current director of the revitalizing squadrons task force. "We can also make Airmen's lives better and more fulfilled."

The team further analyzed the feedback to develop a comprehensive model for squadron vitality.

According to the findings indicated in the implementation plan, Williford said there are three key attributes to a successful squadron: verifiable mission success, purposeful leadership and esprit de corps.

These key attributes are being implemented through three lines of effort: focus on the mission, strengthen leadership and culture, and taking care of Airmen and Families.

Focus on the mission

Verifiable mission success means aligning a clearly stated mission purpose from the command-level down to each task an Airman performs. Highly successful squadrons clearly define, understand, and communicate their purpose, asking every member of the squadron, "why?" until the purpose behind every task is aligned to mission success.

While this may appear rather easy, the team found that many units struggled with clearly defining and communicating their purpose.

Verifiable mission success drives a culture described as "mission command" in which members of the unit clearly understand why their unit exists; therefore, their efforts are directly in-line with mission outcomes, which enables empowerment throughout the unit.

The plan also calls for better enabling squadron leaders to focus on their missions. For example, support staffs will work with commanders to push daily decision authority to the lowest practical level while scrubbing overly restrictive Air Force Instructions and updating organization models to align with the new National Defense Strategy.

This helps every Airman gain a clarity of purpose to understand how they contribute, add value and are valued.

Strengthening squadron leadership and culture

Purposeful leadership means valuing mission outcomes, investing time in Airmen development, and creating an environment where taking smart risks is rewarded to find better ways of getting the mission done, seizing the opportunity to learn from mistakes.

Starting in the fall an Air University squadron commander foundational course will be launched to better prepare officers (and civilians for squadron-like units) for purposeful command.

"The first time an Airman leads a large team is as a flight chief or a flight commander," Williford said. "So flight commander and flight chief courses will be developed at the wing-level to help enable leaders to focus on the key skills to succeed in this first essential level of leadership."

In addition, boosting mental and physical fitness is a key ingredient of the leadership and culture line of effort. While there will be no changes to physical fitness standards and tests, squadron leadership gains authority for administering physical fitness tests, and wing commanders will build incentive programs to reward innovative unit-level fitness programs that increase Airmen readiness.

Taking care of Airmen and their families

Williford said the third, esprit de corps, may happen naturally when the previous

two are in place.

"It means belonging to a group that's respected, and they are accomplishing something that's larger than themselves," he said. "They are warfighters who belong to a valued team doing meaningful work. That alignment of purpose to the respective unit, to being a member of this group is what we found creates a high level of esprit de corps."

The plan includes helping squadrons better support Airmen and families by building on their resilience, strengthening family support programs and community connections.

"We tangibly discovered that focusing on supporting families gave the Airmen more focus at work," Williford said. "An Airman who is fulfilled and has a good work-life balance comes to work more focused."

"The process of being able to achieve that long-term vision that the CSAF and the Secretary of the Air Force have, that's incredibly exciting," the director of the task force said. "We know it's a long process to get there, but we're excited to be a part of it."

8/8/2018 - CAMP FOSTER, Okinawa - Marines from 3rd Transport Support Battalion preformed a two-day, noncombatant evacuation operations training Aug. 6-7 on Kadena Air Base and Marine Corps Air Station Futenma.

During the training, 3rd TSB set up an evacuation control center inside terminals at the air station for volunteers to check-in before and after their fight.


"We are working in conjunction with MCAS Iwakuni on this exercise," said 1st Lt. Amanda Henegar, alert contingency Marine Air-Ground Task Force officer in charge with 3rd TSB, Combat Logistics Regiment 3. "The civilian volunteers are checked into the neo-tracking system in MCAS Iwakuni and then flown here to Kadena where we check them into the NTS we have set up in our evacuation control center. This is how we keep track of everyone who is being evacuated."

The training was conducted to simulate a realistic, small-scale evacuation. The volunteers were registered and issued an identification wrist band. The Marines operating the NTS were able to get the volunteers checked into the system effectively with little issue. The American Red Cross was also on site, just like they would be in a real evacuation, to check the volunteers into their Safe-and-Sound program and provide refreshments after landing into Kadena Air Base.

This training is important because it helps us master the employment of the NTS and develop an analog of processing capably in the event the NTS does not function," said Henegar.

Before returning to MCAS Iwakuni the next day, they were screened by MCAS Futenma security and logged back into the NTS.

"I think the hardest part of future practices will be integrating the state department," said Capt. Jessica Davis, landing support company commander with 3rd TSB, CLR-3. "In the event of a real evacuation, our control center will have to link up with their system. Today we had 31 volunteers and were able to process everyone very quickly, but we only had the Marines and Red Cross set up instead of all the entities. I think next time we will have the state department involved too so that we can have a better idea of how we would all work together."



U.S. military has strong words for Beijing after warnings during flight over South China Sea

8/11/2018 — The U.S. military had unusually strong words for Beijing over social media on Saturday after recent reports that an American reconnaissance plane had been warned to "leave immediately" during a flight near China's man-made islands in the contested South China Sea.

Reporters with CNN and the BBC had been given a rare chance Friday to look at the islets in the Spratly chain of the waterway from aboard a U.S. Navy P-8A Poseidon at 16,500 feet.

During the flight, reporters were shown four low-lying coral reefs in the Spratlys — Subi Reef, Fiery Cross Reef, Johnson Reef and Mischief Reef — three of which were turned into garrisons with massive radar installations, scores of buildings and military-grade runways. The crew received six separate warnings from the Chinese military, telling them they were inside Chinese territory and urging them to leave, CNN reported.

"Leave immediately and keep out to avoid any misunderstanding," a voice was heard in a video.

In response, the U.S. military plane noted that it was conducting "lawful military activities beyond the national airspace of any coastal state."

Both reports quoted the U.S. side as saying the warnings were common and had no effect on their operations.

The BBC report also picked up a separate, more vociferous warning by the Chinese, apparently to a Philippine plane nearby. It's tone and wording was starkly different to the ones issued to the U.S. side.

"Philippine military aircraft, I'm warning you again. Leave immediately or you will bear responsibility for all the consequences!" a voice can be heard saying.

Beijing's relations with Manila have improved under Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte, who has not pressed China over the South China Sea. Relations had soured when Duterte's predecessor took their dispute over the waterway to an international tribunal in The Hague, which ruled against China.

Beijing has built up a series of military outposts in the South China Sea, which includes vital sea lanes through which about \$3 trillion in global trade passes each year. The Philippines, Vietnam, Malaysia, Taiwan and Brunei have overlapping claims.

China has said the facilities are for defensive purposes, but some experts say this is part of a concerted bid to cement de facto control of the South China Sea.

Washington has blasted Beijing for the island-building, fearing the outposts could be used to restrict free movement in the waterway, with the U.S. conducting a number of so-called freedom of navigation operations in the area.

On Saturday, at least three of the U.S. military's Twitter accounts had forceful words for China over its warnings.

"We will sail, fly and operate wherever international law allows," the U.S. Navy's verified Twitter account said Saturday in a retweet of the CNN story. The U.S. Indo-Pacific Com-

mand's verified account also retweeted the story, writing that: "The United States will not be 'warned off' from lawful operations in international waters and airspace."

In Japan, where the P-8A that flew near the South China Sea


islands is believed to be based, U.S. Forces Japan's Twitter account echoed this sentiment.

"Japan-based US Navy P-8As contribute to regional peace and security every day by flying wherever international law allows," it tweeted.

Chinese structures are pictured on one of the disputed Spratly islands in the South China Sea on April 21.





8/13/2018 - CAMP GONSALVES, Okinawa — Marines are known for always

being ready for any obstacle that may come their way. Historically, Marines have fought up mountains, through jungles, and across deserts. Nowadays combat is few and far between; however, Marines continue to train in austere terrain to keep their skills sharp and to continue bettering their techniques.

One of the locations that Marines train is Jungle Warfare Training Center Camp Gonsalves on Okinawa, Japan. Marines learn how to navigate through the dense marsh, repel down steep cliffs, and better their knowledge of patrolling through the area and its terrain.

"You get to see how the units actually work in the jungle," said Sgt. Nathaniel Strahle, the chief instructor at JWTC. "The jungle itself provides a very dynamic environment in which not a lot of people are accustomed."

Marines are taught jungle survival skills from the instructors at JWTC putting them in the combat mindset, Every Marine is a Riflemen.

"This course gives Marines the oppor-

tunity to teach other Marines in areas that I'm proficient in," said Cpl. Caleb Buck a rappelling instructor at JWTC. "I get to train them in rappelling and other infantry related knowledge that is useful in the jungle."

All units get a chance to experience fighting in the jungle at JWTC. Through the mental to physical exhaustion, they create a deeper sense of comradery that one wouldn't particularly find working in an office.

"The Jungle Warfare Training Center is great for any unit to attend. It's uncomfortable at times and embracing uncommon situations is never easy. Yet, when you're around a good group of people it doesn't seem as bad." said Sgt. James West a squad leader with Bravo Company, 3rd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion, forward deployed to 4th Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division.










New DOD policy prohibits GPS-enabled devices in deployed settings

Deployed service members are going to have to ditch their "geolocation devices" in response to a new memo from Deputy Defense Secretary Patrick M. Shanahan.

This includes physical fitness aids, applications in phones that track locations, and other devices and apps that pinpoint and track the location of individuals.

"Effective immediately, Defense Department personnel are prohibited from using geolocation features and functionality on government and nongovernment-issued devices, applications and services while in locations designated as operational areas," Pentagon spokesman Army Col. Robert Manning III told Penta-

gon reporters yesterday.

Deployed personnel are in "operational areas," and commanders will make a determination on other areas where this policy may apply.

The market for these devices has exploded over the past few years, with many service members incorporating them into their workout routines. They use the devices and applications to track their pace, running routes, calories burned and more. These devices then store the information and upload it to central servers where it can be shared with third parties. That information can present enemies with information on military operations.

USING GPS DEVICES POSE RISK

"The rapidly evolving market

of devices, applications and services with geolocation capabilities presents a significant risk to the Department of Defense personnel on and off duty, and to our military operations globally," Manning said.

These Global Positioning System capabilities can expose personal information, locations, routines and numbers of DOD personnel. Their use in overseas locations "potentially create unintended security consequences and increased risk to the joint force and mission," Manning said.

Personal phones and other portable devices also contain apps that rely on GPS technology, and they will be affected. Commanders will be responsible for implementing the policy, and they will be allowed to make exceptions only after conducting a thorough risk assessment.

Security is at the heart of this guidance. DOD is seeking a balanced way that allows for legitimate official and personal uses of geolocation technology that does not impact security.

Manning said the department will continue to study the risk associated with these devices and change the policy as needed.

TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select plan information for calendar year 2018

The following changes or improvements to your TRICARE benefits apply for calendar year 2018: TRICARE Select will replace TRICARE Standard and TRICARE Extra on January 1. TRICARE Select brings together the features of TRICARE Standard and TRICARE Extra in a single plan. Enrollees who obtain services from TRICARE network providers will pay lower cost sharing amounts for network care. All current TRICARE beneficiaries will be automatically enrolled in their respective plan on January 1. TRICARE Prime plan enrollees will remain in their TRICARE Prime plan. TRICARE Standard and Extra beneficiaries will be enrolled in a TRICARE Select plan. Beneficiaries can choose to enroll in or change their TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select coverage during an annual open enrollment period in November-December, 2018 for coverage beginning on January 1, 2019. For calendar year 2019, failure to enroll in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select results in the termination of coverage for civilian care. These beneficiaries who choose to not enroll may only receive care at a military clinic or hospital on a space available basis. Did You Know? THE TRICARE RETIREE DENTAL PROGRAM (TRDP) ENDS ON DEC. 31, 2018.

Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP)

On December 31, 2018, the Defense Health Agency's TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) will end. However, as directed in the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2017, retired uniformed service members and their families, who were eligible for TRDP, will have the opportunity to enroll in the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP).

The first opportunity to enroll in FEDVIP will be during the next Federal Benefits Open Season, which runs from November 12 through December 10, 2018, with coverage effective January 1, 2019. If you are currently enrolled in a TRDP plan, you will not be automatically enrolled in a FEDVIP plan for 2019. You must enroll during open season.

FEDVIP Dental Benefits:

- 1.5M current enrollees in TRDP
- Retired members of the Uniformed Services and National Guard/Reserve components
- Current spouses of enrolled members, and children up to age 21, or to age 23 if a fulltime student
- Un-remarried surviving spouses or eligible children of

 deceased members who perished while in retired status or while on active duty.

FEDVIP Vision Benefits:

- Those enrolled in TRICARE Reserve Select or TRICARE Retired Reserve
- Uniformed services active duty family members
- Uniformed services retirees and retiree family members
- Those entitled to TRICARE For Life

INFORMATION How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur.
