MDG experiences dose of Payne

Air Force Maj. Gen. Lee E. Payne, the
Defense Health Agency Assistant Director for Combat Support, and Military
Health System Electronic Health Record
Functional Champion, visited Joint Base
Elmendorf-Richardson, Alaska, July 9.

Payne highlighted the new electronic health record MHS Genesis and what some of the changes associated with it will be.

According to www.health.mil, one of the missions of the MHS is to ensure America's 1.4 million active duty and 331,000 reserve-component personnel

are healthy so they can complete their national security mission.

Some of the benefits include:

- Faster and better management of chronic, complex, and time-sensitive conditions
- Automated, real-time clinical decision support for doctors and care providers
- Increased patient engagement capabilities that allow patients to directly communicate with their providers
- Lower overall maintenance costs for legacy systems
- Full compliance with the Department of Defense's cybersecurity requirements

As the functional champion, Payne mentioned he is the community's link to the new program's office and Defense Health Agency.

"I have listened to all of you about quality, safety and the problems the record system has," said Payne. "We have a team at the DHA that manages the record on a day-to-day basis, and is working every day to improve the interface with providers and patients."

The new electronic health record, MHS Genesis, integrates all aspects of care and is integral in provision and coordination of safe, quality care. It connects medical and dental information across the continuum of care, whether on the battlefield or at home in the military hospital.

In addition, it empowers the military health enterprise, enabling the MHS to be a high-reliability organization. With the deployment of MHS Genesis, many changes will be experienced by the provider and beneficiary audiences, as the MHS becomes a more integrated system of health and readiness.

Payne emphasized MHS Genesis, which is scheduled to roll out September 2020, will have its challenges.

"We are here to tell you about the beginnings and complexities of this journey, what we need to do collectively, and what you all need to do specifically," Payne said. "We all need to pay attention to this process in order to be as successful as possible."

He also expressed his desires and expectations for MHS Genesis, and encouraged everyone to approach it with a positive attitude.

"My intent is to make you excited about MHS Genesis," said Payne. "I think it's going to bring us more capabilities, deliver safer health care, and push us into the future with our partnership with Veterans Affairs. Get excited about this, help your people get excited about it, and let's make this as successful as possible."



DoD delays Post 9/11 GI Bill changes

434th Aerial Refueling Wing Public Affairs 7/11/2019 - GRISSOM AIR RESERVE BASE, Ind. — The Department of Defense delayed the implementation of a policy that would limit a service member's ability to share education benefits with family members.

The policy, originally slated to take

effect July 12, will discontinue the transfer benefit for members with 16 years or more of service.

The implementation has been delayed until January 12, 2020, giving long-serving members more time to transfer their education benefits to spouses or dependents.

Currently, members who serve a minimum of six years and commit to serving

another four years can transfer their education benefits to dependents.

Those who agree to four additional years but who are unable to complete them because of a service-connected injury, medical discharge or receive a waiver can also keep their transfer benefits.

If a service member has more than 16 years of service after January 12, 2020, he or she will not be able to transfer GI bill

benefits.

Purple Heart recipients will be able to transfer any unused benefits regardless of years of service.

"This extension will be significant for our Airmen, or any service member, with longer careers," said Senior Master Sgt. Adam Oswalt, 434th Air Refueling Wing training technician. "It gives them more time to make an informed decision or start the transfer process."



Leaders of MWHS-1 tour Japan Coast Guard





COAST GUARD CUTTER, NAVY DESTROYER JOIN EXPEDITIONARY STRIKE GROUP 7

7/12/2019 - TASMAN SEA — Legend-class U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Stratton (WMSL 752) and Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS McCampbell (DDG 85) joined the Wasp Expeditionary Strike Group (ESG) for exercise Talisman Sabre 2019.

Along with the Wasp-class amphibious assault ship USS Wasp (LHD 1), San Antonio-class amphibious transport dock USS Green Bay (LPD 20), Whidbey Island-class amphibious dock landing ship USS Ashland (LSD 48), Stratton and McCampbell will participate as members of the Wasp ESG through the end of July.

"Adding an Arleigh Burke DDG and Legend-class cutter to our strike group improves our lethality and makes us an even more capable fighting team," said Rear Admiral Fred W. Kacher, commander, Expeditionary Strike Group 7. "Talisman Sabre allows us to sharpen our warfighting skills with some of our longest standing allies and great friends in the region. The diversity and versatility of the force we've amassed for this exercise gives us a unique opportunity to broaden our mutual understanding and strengthen our commitment to each other and the Indo-Pacific region."

As one of the newest and most capable Legend-class ships, Stratton recently relieved USCGC Bertholf (WMSL 750) in the U.S. 7th Fleet area of operations to continue the U.S. Coast Guard's presence abroad.

"As one of the five armed forces of the United States, the Coast Guard supports defense operations as part of the National



Fleet and Joint Services," said Capt. Ralph Little, commanding officer of the Bertholf. "Talisman Sabre 19 and the 2019 deployments of Stratton and Bertholf help ensure interoperability and economy of force in worldwide defense missions."

Talisman Sabre 2019 will be the eighth iteration of the biennial exercise. With over 34,000 U.S. and Australian participants, the exercise will enable the partners to conduct operations in a combined, joint and interagency environment that will increase both countries' ability to plan and execute contingency responses, from combat missions to humanitarian assistance

U.S. Army Pacific Public Affairs Office 7/10/2019 - SHOALWATER BAY, QLD, Australia — The U.S. Armed Forces, along with the Australian Defence Force, New Zealand Defence Force and Japan Defence Force, conducted high mobility artillery rocket system training in Queensland, Australia, during Exercise Talisman Sabre 2019, July 8.

TS19 is a U.S. Indo-Pacific Command-sponsored exercise that trains USINDOPACOM and the ADF across hi-end, mid-intensity warfighting scenarios involving a Combined Task Force.

"It's an opportunity showcase a capability the U.S. is developing for the Pacific, which is a highly mobile rocket system," said U.S. Marine Corps Col. Michael Roach, 12th Marines commanding officer. "More importantly, what I think we've gained is reinforcing interoperability and friendships between the U.S. and Australian alliance within the Pacific."

TS19, which runs from late June to early August, is a bilateral military training exercise with more than 34,000 U.S. and Australian military personnel.

Roach said an exercise like this takes a great deal of planning. It

happens every two years and is the culmination of American and Australian partners working together to train thousands of service members.

"I think the most important thing gained from exercises like Talisman Sabre is operating in a joint environment, having multiple systems, countries and services integrate and communicate with each other to achieve a unified goal," Roach said.

The training demonstrated the insertion of aircraft and HIMARS belonging to the U.S. Army and Marine Corps under the command and control of the

HIMARS from both III Marine Expeditionary Force and 2nd Infantry Division, Division Artillery, with an element from the 17th Fires Brigade demonstrated the flexibility and lethality of the joint-force during TS19. U.S. Marine Corps KC-130J and U.S. Air Force C-130s carried U.S. Army and Marine Corps HIMARS to execute a realistic mission.

This aerial insertion artillery raid gave commanders the ability to rapidly deploy and extend range precision strike capability to shape the battle space and engage high-value targets.

'It's not all the time that we

actually get to do these things, but the fact that we're out here getting to shoot these rockets, having a good time with everyone else, is something that we are taking to heart and honoring," said U.S. Marine Corps LCpl. Brice Bowles, 5th Battalion, 11th Marines M142 HIMARS motor vehicle operator.

Exercises like TS19 provide realistic, relevant training necessary to maintain and strengthen regional security, peace and stability. TS19 also provides effective and intense training to ensure U.S. Forces are combat ready, capable, interoperable, and deployable on short notice.

Anderson said it felt great to win.

"It was a tough competition out there; it was a great competition," Anderson said. "A lot of really good guys out there. I'm glad I was able to come out on top."

Burns agreed saying it had been a hard

Tricare Corner: Overseas Enrollment

All newborn and adopted children must be registered in DEERS within 120 days. To do this, the sponsor must go to a uniform services ID card office and present the child's birth certificate, certificate of live birth from the hospital, record of adoption, or letter of placement of your child into your home by a recognized placement, adoption agency or the court. Once they are registered in DEERS, your child will be automatically enrolled in TOP Select. You will need to change or transfer your newborn's enrollment to TOP Prime (if command sponsored) within 120 days of birth or adoption. If you do not enroll within the 120-day period, your child will remain in TOP Select. If your child is registered in DEERS after the allotted time period, they will only be able to receive care on a space available basis at a military hospital or clinic, and a PCM will not be assigned to your child. The sponsor can only enroll the child in an eligible TRICARE plan if they have a Qualifying Life Event or during the annual TRICARE Open Season. For more information, visit www.tricare.mil/ overseas or visit your local TRICARE office.

How to File a Complaint with IG

If you believe you are unable to resolve your complaint through supervisory channels, you may seek IG assistance to determine if the complaint should be filed with the IG. You can file a complaint if you reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedures, or regulation has been committed. Complete the personnel data information on an AF Form 102 and briefly outline the facts and relevant information related to the issue or complaint. List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail and documents later, when interviewed by an IG person. Allegations should be written as bullets and should answer who committed the violation; what violation was committed; what law, regulation, procedures, or policy was violated; when did the violation occur. Do you face concerns of unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment? If so, Kadena AB leadership maintains a strict "zero-tolerance" policy pertaining to discriminatory behavior. If you feel you are being unlawfully discriminated against, to include sexual harassment, take action.

We encourage members to use the chain of command first to resolve issues at the lowest level. However, you can also contact the EO office at 634-2571 to set up an appointment; or you may visit our office. Please note that the EO office will not accept a formal complaint more than 60 calendar days for military and 45 calendar days for civilian complaints after the alleged offense occurred without sufficient justification.

Safety Message Regarding Divers and UXOs

With peak diving season around the corner, it is imperative that divers are aware of the potential hazards of tampering with or recovering unexploded ordnance (UXO) within the waters of Okinawa, Japan. If any ordnance items are found in the waters, recreational divers should not relocate, recover, or touch said items. Individuals who recover these items risk potential harm to themselves or others in the area. Furthermore, transporting UXOs through residential areas and on/off installations risk the potential of creating an international incident if involved in either an accident or when stopped by local police.






